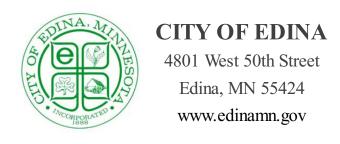

#### **ROLL CALL**

#### **REVIEW OF APPLICANTS - RACE & EQUITY TASK FORCE**

City Manager Neal reviewed the Race & Equity Task Force. The nine member task force will make recommendations on policies, practices and strategies for the City to identify and eliminate race-based disparities in Edina city government facilities, services and institutions. Three working groups will be appointed to support the Task Force as follows:

- The Services Working Group will focus on the City's public services, such as public safety, community health and park maintenance. Five members appointed by the City Council and two by the City Manager.
- The Facilities Working Group will focus on the City's public facilities such as parks, City Hall and Edina Liquor stores. . Five members appointed by the City Council and two by the City Manager.
- The Institutional Working Group will focus on internal City procedures and practices such as employment practices. Five members appointed by the City Council and two by the City Manager.

Mr. Neal suggested that the three members from the City's HRRC that are serving on Government Alliance on Race & Equity (GARE) be appointed to the Task Force. He suggested the Council fill the Task Force members then work on the three working groups.

The Council discussed the process and their consensus was that one of the three HRRC Commissioners be appointed to the Task Force and the other two to working groups. Council members reviewed the applicants and are suggesting the following slate of applicants for appointment.

#### I. CALL TO ORDER

#### IV. COMMUNITY COMMENT

Pete Lefebvre, 6412 Aspen Road, shared his neighborhood's concerns about the Nine Mile Creek Regional Trail design and elevated boardwalks and bridges near Walnut Grove Park.

Greg Wright, 6705 Field Way, shared continued concerns about the increased traffic due to the Highway 169 reconstruction, particularly on Parkwood Lane. He commented on increased segmented traffic patterns and suggested it related to the traffic signal over the Londonderry Road exit.

The Council indicated comments regarding potential street closures at Dovre, Lincoln, and Malibu Drives would be addressed under the Consent Agenda.

Guled Said, 4250 Parklawn Avenue, #102, commented about the lack of resources for children of color in the Parklawn area and suggested creating something to address this concern. He believed lack of activities could result in youth becoming involved in poor activities.

Laurie Chapman, 6420 Aspen Road, asked for consideration to advocate for residents of this area to address the extreme height of the Nine Mile Creek Regional Trail by asking for a variance with Three Rivers Park District.

#### ITEMS REMOVED FROM THE CONSENT AGENDA

#### V.J. RESOLUTION NO. 2017-14; AUTHORIZE TRAFFIC DIVERTERS – ADOPTED

Council confirmed this action would delegate authority to staff to install traffic diverters in locations deemed appropriate to promote health, safety, and welfare of the citizens associated with the Highway 169 closure in real time to better respond to the traffic concerns. Council noted the flexibility still needed to allow for notification and might not be instantaneous.

Member Brindle introduced and moved adoption of Resolution 2017-14 Authorizing Traffic Diverters revising Paragraph 1 to indicate: "...to install traffic diverters in the Lincoln Drive and Dovre Drive intersection and the Lincoln Drive and Malibu Drive intersection and areas in the north-east part of Edina." Member Fischer seconded the motion.

#### VI. SPECIAL RECOGNITIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

## VI.A. KATIE CLARK SIEBEN, METROPOLITAN AIRPORTS COMMISSION REPRESENTATIVE – PRESENTED

Katie Clark Sieben, Metropolitan Airports Commission Representative, shared her background with the Council, stating the airport was viewed as a first impression and served the community. She invited the public to attend NOC's public listening session on April 26 and indicated a quarterly communication piece would now be provided.

## VI.B. EARTH PROJECT CLUB iMATTER REPORT CARD – EDINA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS – PRESENTED

Edina High School students from Project Earth Club presented information on climate change and shared the City's iMatter Report Card. Gauri Madhok, Joanna Kim, Grant Wothe, Allison Risser, and Rozy Eastaugh shared how they are working to fight climate change and thanked the Edina Energy Commission for its support. The students described their work through fundraisers to educate and purchase composting bins for use at the high school and presented the City's Youth Climate Report Card and ways to improve the grade by creating a climate action plan. The students presented a petition in support of addressing climate change and asked for commitment of the City Council.

#### Minutes/Edina City Council/February 7, 2017

The Council thanked the students and indicated support to engage the Edina Energy Commission to determine how Edina can better address climate change.

#### VI.C. SPEAK UP, EDINA!: SOUTHDALE LIBRARY CENTER - PRESENTED

Kaylin Eidsness outlined the public engagement process used to gather information on proposed redevelopment of the Southdale Library Center. She presented a summary of comments, requests, and suggestions received. Ms. Eidsness said the next *Speak Up, Edina* topic would be redevelopment of the Southdale Library Center and shared about Speak Up Edina regarding neighborhood parks.

Council commented the *Speak Up, Edina* topics were timely and the Southdale Library Center would be of interest to the County.

**VII. REPORTS/RECOMMENDATIONS** – (Favorable vote of majority of Council Members present to approve except where noted).

## VII.A. REQUEST FOR PURCHASE: CONTRACT FOR PLANNING SERVICES – 2018 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN – APPROVED

Community Development Director Teague explained that every 10 years, the City of Edina was required to update its Comprehensive Plan, which was due by December 31, 2018. In late October 2016, staff issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Planning Consultants to assist with the preparation of the Plan. The Planning Commission interviewed three consulting firms that responded to the RFP and recommended a consulting team led by William Smith of Biko Associates to assist the City in updating the current Plan. He explained additional tasks were added to the original RFP response including additional evening meetings/public engagement in order to conduct the small area plans separately; 3D modeling for the small area plans; and, enhanced market analysis/economic competitiveness sections to include Southdale area and Industrial Park west of Highway 100.

Bill Smith, Biko Associates, shared the team's background and reviewed the proposed work program that would span over 1.5 years over four phases. He said they would create small citizen workgroups, engage with Boards and Commissions, and connect with the school district, members of iMatter, and the Edina Energy Commission. He outlined a community-wide kick-off event would be held at the end of March to engage the public in the process

The Council referred to the 70<sup>th</sup> Avenue/Kahill Street project area and offered assistance, if needed, to help engage the community. The Council commented on the 9-Mile Creek Regional Trail and opportunity to change the schedule to provide vision between this project and the Comprehensive Plan. Council also commented on hosting a creative community event.

Member Staunton made a motion, seconded by Member Brindle, to approve the contract for planning services for the 2018 Comprehensive Plan with Biko Associates, Inc., in the amount of \$189,840.00.

## VII.B. SKETCH PLAN – NW CORNER OF VALLEY VIEW ROAD AND KELLOGG AVENUE – REVIEWED

#### Community Development Director Presentation

Community Development Director Teague outlined the proposed project to redevelop the northwest corner of Valley View Road and Kellogg Avenue. The project included land owned by the Edina HRA at the intersection and the adjoining properties of 6120, 6116, and 6112 Kellogg Avenue and included constructing a two-story office/retail building of 5,000 square feet on the first level with five affordable housing units on the second level. The project would include eight two-story townhomes similar to the recently completed Brownstones on France and two single-family homes would be removed at 6116 and 6112 Kellogg Avenue.

#### **Proponent Presentation**

Edward, Noonan, Noonan Construction, shared history of the site and outlined the relationship to Valley View Road. He noted the buildings would be closer to sidewalks to make a more pedestrian-friendly environment and the affordable housing units were changed from five to four even though they were not required. He reviewed drainage collection, inset parking along Kellogg Street, and shared elevations with brownstone and gables with eight units across and possibly ten without affecting parking availability. Mr. Noonan shared the common area proposal with elevators and 750-square foot units with commercial office space below of 3,500 square feet and shared proposed elevations.

The Council commented on appropriate use of the site and that aligning with the commercial parking behind the site made sense but noted feedback was needed on the small area plan and whether the transition was correct. They questioned whether five units were in fact workable as they may be too long and narrow. The Council indicated the commercial feel seemed tight to the street and support was voiced for the porches in front and how the proponent worked to show a high level of detail. The Council concurred it was important to fit the area with the townhomes as a nice transition to the rest of the neighborhood.

The Council complimented the proponent on including an affordable housing element and said it was important the project be open and engaging, not a wall blocking off the area. The Council indicated setbacks from the Kellogg Avenue side seemed appropriate and that some open space between Kellogg and Valley View would be good. It was noted the sketches seemed somewhat boxy but the Council was confident that would be addressed.

The Council commented on the project symmetry by providing screening as a nice transition from the east to the west with stoops or front porches in front of the townhomes for a residential feel. The proponent was cautioned about commercial and embracing the front of Valley View as well as Kellogg for openness to parking and circulation challenges instead of just commercial and residential.

The Council said the Brownstones on France are similar with entrances set back six feet but different materials throughout for a change in appearance. The Council indicated more room was needed on the bottom and suggested setting in the lower levels. The Council commented on accessibility concerns in the affordable housing units with parking across the street and its preference for a price point of \$800,000 to \$1 million to blend better with the neighborhood.

The Council commented on accessibility and current property owners and asked the proponent to inform the City if they do not wish to purchase the City's property. The Council referred to the need to engage and embrace the street instead of being off-putting and shared that the proposal now might not have the right feel. The Council indicated residential all the way to Valley View between Kellogg and Wooddale might not be the best choice and stressed the importance of engaging Valley View with the commercial on the ground level as the better answer than residential in between two commercial areas.

## VII.C. RESOLUTION 2017-13 ADOPTED - ACCEPTING VARIOUS GRANTS AND DONATIONS - ADOPTED

Mayor Hovland explained that in order to comply with State Statutes; all donations to the City must be adopted by Resolution and approved by four favorable votes of the Council accepting the donations. **Member Brindle introduced and moved adoption of Resolution No. 2017-13 accepting various grants and donations.** Member Fischer seconded the motion.

#### **Information / Background:**

At the January 4, 2017 City Council work session, Council provided feedback on board and commission practices. Council provided direction to staff to make the following changes:

- 1) Change the Board of Appeals and Equalization term limits to 2 three-year terms.
- 2) Change the number of terms a Commission member may serve as chair of their respective commission from two to three. Feedback was solicited from the Board and Commission and their response was as follows: term limits could be longer; keep the annual elections allowing new opportunities for the chair role to various members, and keep the vice chair terms as unlimited.
- 3) Remove the council joint work session from the attendance requirement.
- 4) Change Heritage Preservation Board name to Heritage Preservation Commission
- 5) Change Park Board name to Parks and Recreation Commission
- 6) Change the Park Board membership requirement in regard to school district seat.

# ORDINANCE NO. 2017-02 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE EDINA CITY CODE CONCERNING BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

#### THE CITY COUNCIL OF EDINA ORDAINS:

**SECTION 1.** Section 2-81 (a) of the Edina City Code is amended to provide as follows:

Regular members. Board and commission members shall be appointed by majority vote of the Council. Members of Arts and Culture Commission, Edina Community Health Commission, Energy and Environment Commission, Construction Board of Appeals, Heritage Preservation Board, Human Rights and Relations Commission, Park Board, Transportation Commission, and Board of Appeal and Equalization are eligible to serve two, three-year terms. Members of the Planning Commission are eligible to serve three, three-year terms. A member in good standing shall serve until a successor has been appointed.

**SECTION 2.** Section 2-83 (b) of the Edina City Code is amended to provide as follows:

Chairperson and vice-chairperson. Each board or commission annually shall elect from its members a chairperson and vice-chairperson to serve a term of one year. No person shall serve more than three consecutive one-year terms as chairperson of a particular board or commission. A chairperson elected to fill a vacancy shall be eligible to serve three full terms in addition to the remainder of the vacated term. There are no term limits for the position of vice-chairperson.

**SECTION 3.** Section 2-86 (b)(2) of the Edina City Code is amended to provide as follows:

The member, regular or student fails to attend at least 75 percent of the regular scheduled meetings in any calendar year, not including the joint work sessions with the Council. For a member, regular or student, whose term begins during a calendar year, attendance in that calendar year is measured as at least 75 percent of the scheduled meetings following the beginning of the member's term.

**SECTION 4.** Chapter 2, Division 5 of the Edina City Code is amended to provide as follows:

#### **DIVISION 5. HERITAGE PRESERVATION COMMISSION**

Sec. 2-184. - Policy and establishment.

The Council finds that historically significant buildings, sites, structures, objects and districts represent scarce, nonrenewable heritage resources that are critical assets for community development; that heritage preservation is an important public service and a legitimate responsibility of city government; and that the preservation, protection and

enhancement of significant heritage resources for the benefit of present and future citizens is a public necessity. Therefore, pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 471.193, the Council continues the Heritage Preservation Board as the City's Heritage Preservation Commission.

#### Sec. 2-185. - Purpose.

The commission shall assist and advise the Council, manager, and other city boards and commissions on all matters relating to heritage resource preservation, protection and enhancement. The commission shall safeguard the significant heritage resources of the city by identifying significant heritage resources and nominating them for designation by the Council as city heritage landmarks; by developing and maintaining a comprehensive preservation plan; by reviewing applications for city permits in relation to properties designated as city heritage landmarks; and by encouraging the preservation, rehabilitation, restoration and reconstruction of significant heritage resources through public education.

#### Sec. 2-186. - Definitions.

Unless otherwise stated, or unless the context clearly indicates a different meaning, the words or phrases in the following list of definitions shall, for the purposes of this division, have the meanings indicated:

Certificate of appropriateness means a certificate issued by the city planner and attached to a city permit evidencing compliance with the city's comprehensive heritage preservation plan.

*City planner* means city staff member responsible for zoning administration.

Comprehensive heritage preservation plan means the official guide plan for implementing the city's heritage resource preservation policies, adopted by the Council, which establishes goals and priorities and integrates heritage preservation with other planning data.

Edina Heritage Landmark or city heritage landmark means any heritage resource so designated by the Council that is significant in history, architecture, archeology or culture and therefore worthy of preservation and consideration in city planning.

*Evaluation* means the process of determining whether identified heritage resources meet defined criteria of historical, architectural, archeological or cultural significance.

Heritage preservation commission means the heritage preservation advisory commission appointed by the Council.

Heritage resource means any prehistoric or historic building, site, structure, object or district that has historical, architectural, archeological or cultural value to the citizens of the city, the state or the United States.

*Preservation* means the act or process of applying measures to sustain the existing form, structure, integrity, and material of a heritage resource.

Reconstruction means the act or process of reproducing by new construction the exact form and detail of a vanished building, structure or object as it appeared during a specific period of time.

Rehabilitation means the act or process of returning a heritage resource to a state of utility through repair or alteration that makes possible an efficient contemporary use while preserving those portions or features of the property which are significant to its historical, architectural, archeological or cultural values.

Restoration means the act or process of accurately recovering the form and details of a heritage resource and its setting as it appeared at a particular period of time by means of removal of later work or by the replacement of missing historic features.

Significance means the heritage preservation value of buildings, sites, structures, objects and districts that are linked to important historical events or persons, or that represent notable expressions of architecture or engineering, or that have yielded important information about prehistory or history.

*Survey* means the physical search for and recording of heritage resources that result in an inventory of buildings, sites, structures, objects and districts worthy of consideration in city planning.

#### Sec. 2-187. - Duties and responsibilities.

#### The commission shall:

- (1) Advise the Council, manager, and other city boards and commissions and provide leadership for implementing the heritage preservation regulations.
- (2) Develop and maintain a comprehensive plan for heritage resource preservation to ensure that community development policies and decisions respect the city's heritage and promote stewardship of heritage resources.
- (3) Conduct an ongoing survey of historic buildings, sites, structures, objects, and districts and maintain an inventory of the heritage resources in the city.
- (4) Conduct evaluations to determine the eligibility of heritage resources for designation as city heritage landmarks.
- (5) Nominate heritage resources for designation as city heritage landmarks by the city Council.

- (6) Review city permit applications in relation to city heritage landmarks and make recommendations to the city planner with respect to issuance of certificates of appropriateness.
- (7) Review and make recommendations to the planning commission on development projects that affect properties designated heritage landmarks or determined eligible for designation as heritage landmarks.
- (8) Inform and educate citizens about the city's heritage and the benefits of preservation.
- (9) Develop regulatory and incentive programs that facilitate heritage preservation.
- (10) Adopt rules of procedure, subject to Council approval, to guide the board's deliberations.
- (11) Prepare an annual report to the Council, describing the board's accomplishments during the past year and presenting goals and objectives for the coming year.

#### Sec. 2-188. - Membership.

- (a) Commission membership. The commission shall consist of nine regular and two student members. Members shall have a demonstrated interest, knowledge, ability or expertise in heritage preservation. At least one member shall be a qualified professional historian, architect, architectural historian, archeologist, planner or the owner of a heritage landmark property.
- (b) City Historical Society membership. A member of the board shall be a member of the city historical society.
- (c) County Historical Society membership. A member of the board shall be a member of the County Historical Society.

#### Sec. 2-189. - Professional staff.

The manager shall provide the commission with professional staff with expertise in heritage preservation.

**SECTION 5.** Chapter 2, Division 7 of the Edina City Code is amended to provide as follows:

#### **DIVISION 7. PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION**

#### Sec. 2-255. - Establishment.

To provide for a City park and open space system and a City recreation program a Parks and Recreation Commission is established.

#### Sec. 2-256. - Duties.

The Parks and Recreation Commission shall develop and review plans and advise the Council on the acquisition and development of parks and recreation facilities, and plan

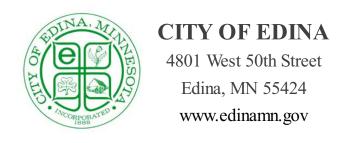
and make recommendations to the Council concerning park activities and recreation programs. The park board shall advise the Council on natural resource, wildlife management, and natural area preservation issues. The park board shall make and furnish studies, reports and recommendations as the Council may request.

#### 2-257. - Membership.

The Parks and Recreation Commission shall consist of ten regular and two student members and one board position that will be an ex officio, non-voting member that is nominated by the Edina School Board and confirmed by the City Council. With the exception of voting, the position will be charged with all the same rights, privileges and responsibilities as the other members of the board. The School District's nominee will comply with the City's rules regarding advisory board and commission members, except that the nominee need not be a resident of the City. The term of this position is subject to nomination and confirmation on an annual basis.

**SECTION 6**. This ordinance is effective immediately upon its passage and publication.

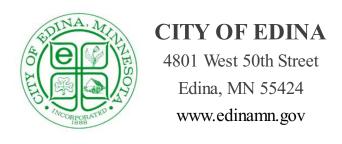

#### INTRODUCTION:

The Hennepin County Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) 2017 Sidewalk Participation Program assists in funding to develop and implement effective sidewalk projects that extend the system of sidewalks along Hennepin County roads, provide pedestrian safety improvements at intersections, provide ADA compliant facilities, support local plans, and support the implementation of the Hennepin County Transportation Systems Plan including the Hennepin County Complete Streets Policy. Council and community support are among the factors considered for the award of funds (County cost participation is up to 25% to a maximum of \$100,000 per project, with construction in 2018). Applications are due to the County by March 1.

Staff is submitting an application for completing the sidewalk gap on the west side of France Avenue South, from W. 40th Street to W. 42nd Street (this segment is on the City's approved Sidewalk Facilities Map). This sidewalk is designated as a "high priority" segment on the Hennepin County Pedestrian Plan. It should be noted that the remaining one-block sidewalk gap from W. 39th Street to W. 40th Street is in the City of St. Louis Park, and their City staff are preparing plans to construct this segment in 2018 as well.

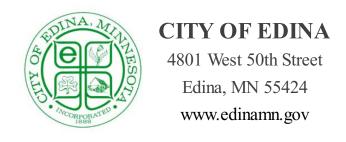

### Information/Background:

This purchase is to replace a 2005 Chevy Silverado truck with 36,123 road miles. Based on repair orders, it is estimated that the truck has 8,400 running hours which equates to approximately 255,000 miles of travel on local roads.

The City's equipment replacement scoring methodology uses six performance and cost variables including age, usage, type of service, condition, repair costs and reliability. Replacement consideration starts at a score of 23 for sedans and light trucks. The higher the score, the higher the need to replace the vehicle. This vehicle has a score of 27.

In the past we have compared fuel economy of full size trucks with smaller trucks and found that the small fuel savings does not offset the initial higher cost of the smaller truck. With CIP #15-181 budget of \$28,000 and the inability of a smaller truck's gas mileage difference to offset the higher cost for the smaller truck, we recommend purchasing the full size pickup truck. The truck will be purchased from the state contract.

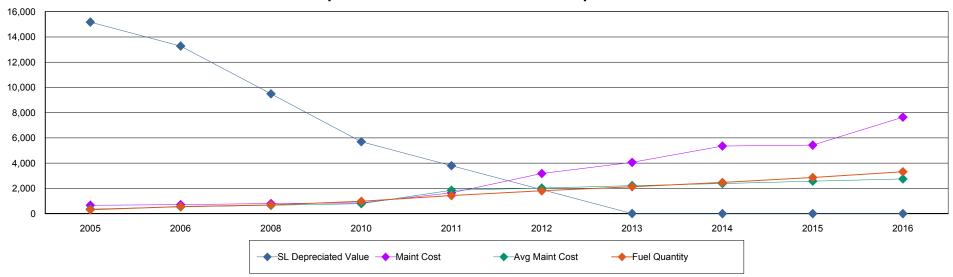

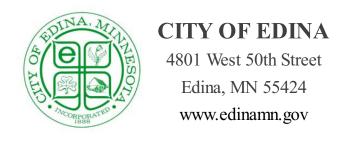

# Information / Background:

The Traffic Safety Committee (TSC) review of traffic safety matters occurred on January 4. The Transportation Planner, Assistant City Planner, Traffic Safety Coordinator, Police Lieutenant, Public Works Director and Traffic Safety Specialist were in attendance for this meeting. The City Engineer was not able to attend and was informed of the decisions and did not object to the recommendations.

For these reviews, the recommendations below are provided. On each of the items, persons involved have been contacted and the staff recommendation has been discussed with them. They were informed that if they disagree with the recommendation or have additional facts to present, these comments can be included on the January 19 Edina Transportation Commission and the February 22 City Council meeting agendas.

#### Section B: Items which staff recommends for no action

- B1. Request for all-way stop at W. 70<sup>th</sup> Street and Antrim Road intersection
  - Requestor believes the three-way stop at a four-way intersection is confusing and causes dangerous situations.
  - 4-leg intersection with a 3-way stop (westbound traffic on 70<sup>th</sup> Street West is uncontrolled).
  - ADT on 70<sup>th</sup> Street is 1,770; 90% of those vehicles travel westbound into intersection.
  - 88% of westbound vehicles turn right onto Antrim Road.



• West 70<sup>th</sup> Street exceeds 200 vehicles per hour twice per day.

- ADT on Antrim Road is 1881; 88% of those vehicles travel southbound
- 85% of southbound vehicles on Antrim Road turn left onto West 70th Street.
- Antrim Road exceeds 200 vehicles per hour once, above 190 two more times
- MnDOT has 2 reported accidents in the last 5 years.



After review, staff recommends not making this intersection an all way stop as it does not may

intersection an all-way stop as it does not meet warrants. However, staff recommends placing new, more visible guide signs below each stop sign at this intersection stating westbound vehicles on W. 70<sup>th</sup> Street do not stop to help decrease the instance of dangerous situations.

- B2. Requesting directional signs for the Christian Family Church located at 7375 Bush Lake Road.
  - New church looking for directional signs for new members unfamiliar with this area.
  - The Christian Family Church has 3 other campuses in Owatonna, Lakeville and Hudson-River Falls.
  - This campus is the closest to the Minneapolis/St. Paul area and is targeting new members from the metro area.
  - Has services on Friday evenings and Sunday mornings.

After review, staff recommends no action for any directional signage. Staff believes it must follow previous decisions to not allow directional signs for churches and businesses as it may set an improper precedent.

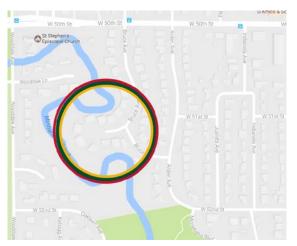




B3. Request for 'No Outlet' or 'Dead End' signage to be posted at entrance of Bruce Place.

- Residents are concerned with the amount of vehicles using the cul-de-sac for U-turns or as a thru street for drivers looking to get to Wooddale Avenue from 50th street.
- Bruce Place used to have No Outlet/Dead End signs before residents wanted to remove them for aesthetic purposes.
- There are 10 homes located within the cul-desac.
- Since the removal of signs, residents say the number of families with children has increased.
   Residents believe the signs will lower the number of vehicles traveling through the culde-sac.
- Between 8 am and 10 pm Bruce Place averages
   18 vehicles utilizing the cul-de-sac as either Uturns or an attempted thru-street.





After review, staff recommends no action. Staff cites the low amount of vehicles passing through Bruce Place does not cause enough concern to warrant signage. Staff believes the end of the cul-de-sac is plenty visible to vehicles traveling past Bruce Place.

### Section C: Items which staff recommends for further study

C1. A resident was concerned with the safety of vehicles traveling on Grimes Avenue between W 42<sup>nd</sup> Street and Morningside Road

- A resident had a question regarding a Hill sign formerly located on the 4200 block of Grimes Avenue to warn northbound vehicles of an upcoming hill.
- The sign was removed between the years 2009 and 2011 as it is not warranted through the MnMUTCD guidelines.
- Parking is prohibited on the west side of Grimes Avenue.
- The hill on Dewey Avenue near W. 42<sup>nd</sup> Street has a length of 390 feet and a slope of 14%.

This item was initially listed under "Section D: Other Traffic Safety Items Handled." However, the ETC recommended further study on this item to investigate speeds, volumes and a camera study. Staff will conduct this study in the spring.

# Section D: Other Traffic Safety Items handled

- D1. A resident was concerned when given a warning for parking on Kellogg Avenue between W. 55<sup>th</sup> Street and W. 54<sup>th</sup> Street. Resident claimed there weren't any 'No Parking' signs placed. After contacting the Police Department, this stretch of Kellogg Avenue limits parking on the west side of the road and the temporary 'No Parking' signs formerly in place may have been accidentally removed. The resident has been notified of the current parking limitation on this stretch of Kellogg Avenue.
- D2. A resident was concerned with traffic totals on West 66<sup>th</sup> St at West Shore Drive. The resident was looking for a stop light claiming it can take up to 10 minutes to find any gaps between vehicles to enter onto W. 66<sup>th</sup> Street. Given the ADT of W. 66<sup>th</sup> Street and West Shore Drive, the current use of pedestrian flashers and crosswalk in this intersection, it does not meet warrants for a stop light.
- D3. A resident requested a four-way stop at Northwood Drive and Mirror Lakes Drive. This was also requested and reported in the July Traffic Safety Report. The Traffic Safety Committee recommended no action in July and the committee agrees the intersection to remain as is.
- D4. A resident was concerned with drivers passing by a special needs bus picking up a student just south of W. 58<sup>th</sup> Street on Wooddale Avenue. After speaking with the resident for a follow-up, the concern is no longer an issue.
- D5. A resident was concerned with the timing of newly placed stop lights at W. 60<sup>th</sup> Street and Xerxes Avenue. This request was forwarded to the City of Minneapolis, as Minneapolis is responsible for maintaining and timing this stop light.

# Appendix A:

# **All-Way Stop Warrants**

Multi-way stop control can be useful as a safety measure at intersections if certain traffic conditions exist. Safety concerns associated with multi-way stops include pedestrians, bicyclists, and all road users expecting other road users to stop. Multi-way stop control is used where the volume of traffic on the intersecting roads is approximately equal.

The restrictions on the use of STOP signs described in Section 2B.4 also apply to multi-way stop applications. The decision to install multi-way stop control should be based on an engineering study. The following criteria should be considered in the engineering study for a multi-way STOP sign installation:

- A. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multiway stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.
- B. Five or more reported crashes in a 12-month period that are susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.
- C. Minimum volumes:
  - The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day; and
  - The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour; but
  - 3. If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major street traffic exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the values provided in Items 1 and 2.
- D. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria B, C.I, and C.2 are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion C.3 is excluded from this condition.

Other criteria that may be considered in an engineering study include:

- A. The need to control left-turn conflicts;
- B. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high pedestrian volumes;
- C. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is also required to stop; and
- D. An intersection of two residential neighborhood collector (through) streets of similar design and operating characteristics where multi-way stop control would improve traffic operational characteristics of the intersection.

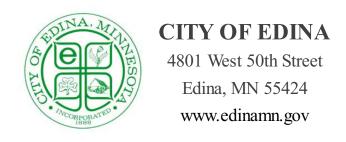

- D.2. ADT should not be used as the determining factor. Planner Nolan said ADT is their first check for meeting warrant; he said the cameras were placed there several years ago and the wait time was no longer than one minute. - D.6. Member Miranda said the 'Hill' sign should be replaced. Planner Nolan will review this again and also provide speed and volume count at the top of the hill as requested.

#### PETITION FOR DECLARATORY RULING

Mobilitie, LLC ("Mobilitie") petitions the Commission pursuant to Section 1.2 of its

Rules for a declaratory ruling interpreting three phrases in Section 253(c) of the Communications

Act of 1934, as amended, to speed the deployment of critical advanced wireless infrastructure.

First, the Commission should interpret "fair and reasonable compensation" to mean charges that

enable a locality to recoup its costs related to issuing permits and managing the rights of way, but

no more. Second, it should interpret "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory" to mean

charges that do not exceed those imposed on other providers for similar access. Third, it should

interpret "publicly disclosed by such government" to obligate localities to make available to a

provider seeking access the rights of way charges they previously imposed on others. These

actions will stop excessive and unfair rights of way fees that are impeding wireless broadband

deployment, provide clarity and certainty to providers and localities alike, head off and resolve

disputes, and thus accelerate more investment in network infrastructure – investment that is necessary to support the American public's exploding demand for wireless broadband.

#### I. INTRODUCTION AND SUMMARY

Wireless facilities and the networks that connect them are the critical infrastructure of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. Wireless, and particularly wireless broadband, is for all practical purposes the newest essential public service, just as telephones and electricity were the essential services of the last century. Robust deployment of wireless facilities and networks demonstrably serves the public interest, and carriers that invest in and build that infrastructure should have the same affordable access to rights of way that companies providing other essential services have enjoyed for decades.

The fundamental purpose of rights of way has always been to benefit the public. Rights of way have always served the public interest by enabling citizens to obtain and use essential services, such as electricity, telephone, gas, water, and transportation.<sup>2</sup> Access to rights of way is a prerequisite to the deployment of the infrastructure that supports those services. Congress has specifically determined that federal, state and local rights of way should be available for communications infrastructure: Section 253 prohibits state and local regulatory "barriers" to new telecommunications services, including barriers to using rights of way.<sup>3</sup>

Removing obstacles to deploying small cell networks in rights of way is particularly important because the wireless broadband those networks deliver will play a vital role in closing any gaps in nationwide broadband deployment. The Commission has found that *all* consumers require wireless broadband to have true and meaningful access to the Internet.<sup>4</sup> Given that over 31 million American adults are smartphone-only, with 15 percent of all Americans having a smartphone as their primary – often only – option for broadband access, actions that further deployment and drive such access clearly serve the public interest.<sup>5</sup> Many citizens who lack access to robust wireless broadband reside in urban areas, where small cell deployments along rights of way offer the optimal, if not the only, solution to making broadband available to meet increasing demand.<sup>6</sup> Given the major role that small cell deployments will play in expanding the availability of wireless broadband and 5G to all Americans, preventing excessive fees that

impede access to public rights of way is imperative. Just as rights of way have served the public by making available other essential services like water and electric power, they now can serve the public by making broadband, the newest essential service, available to all.

Courts have observed that local governments' de facto monopoly control over public rights of way creates the "danger that local governments will exact artificially high rates" for the use of public rights of way. That danger is precisely what is occurring today across the nation, as many localities are leveraging the growing demand for wireless broadband and the corresponding need for new infrastructure to impose excessive rights of way fees. While some communities are working cooperatively with providers and impose relatively low fees, often no more than \$100 for access to a streetlight of utility pole for attaching equipment, others are demanding thousands of dollars in up-front application fees, plus thousands of dollars for each pole as well as additional charges for deploying fiber or other backhaul. Given that small cells and new spectrum bands that will increasingly be used for wireless broadband require multiple sites, these fees when imposed city-wide can run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, far exceeding any possible costs to localities for approving permits and managing their rights of way. Many require these high fees to be paid every year, often with mandatory annual escalations, which can result in rights of way charges of millions of dollars over time. These charges comprise a major component of deployment costs, undermining deployment incentives in these communities and the public interest.8

Reaping the promise of wireless broadband and now 5G requires massive investments in cell sites, backhaul, and transport facilities, as well as access to rights of way for building that infrastructure. Mobilitie, the nation's largest privately held wireless infrastructure provider, is making those investments. The company builds microwave, fiber, and other facilities to supply backhaul and transport to other carriers, principally on new or existing poles along roads and other rights of way. It also constructs small cells and WiFi networks in rights of way for use by wireless carriers. For Mobilitie and other firms that will lead the national effort to invest in the nation's wireless future, rapid access to rights of way at reasonable and nondiscriminatory prices (as promised by Section 253) is critical. Conversely, excessive and discriminatory rents, fees and other charges threaten to impede those investments and slow the deployment of essential wireless infrastructure. High charges imposed by localities can also make the competitive provision of new services cost-prohibitive, suppressing new entry and competition.

Commission action interpreting Section 253(c)'s limits on rights of way charges is particularly imperative given that the National Public Safety Broadband Network, "FirstNet," plans to launch next year. Congress created FirstNet in the 2012 Spectrum Act to provide a comprehensive state of the art national wireless network for the nation's public safety agencies. The heart of FirstNet's plan is to construct or lease capacity on radio access networks, backhaul, and transport facilities nationwide, working with contractors which will likely include wireless

carriers and infrastructure providers. FirstNet's vision is to provide local public safety agencies with immense new data capabilities in order to respond to the emergencies that constantly occur in cities and rural communities across America. But achieving that vision will depend on dense deployments of many sites across localities, which will in turn require extensive new backhaul and transport capacity. It is not feasible for FirstNet to accomplish its objectives without access to rights of way for its sites at reasonable and nondiscriminatory rates. Commission action interpreting Section 253(c) will directly assist FirstNet and in turn help fulfill Congress's public safety objectives.

To achieve its cardinal goal of preventing barriers to the deployment of new services, Section 253(c) limits the charges states and localities may impose for rights of way access. Such charges must be "fair and reasonable compensation" for the use of that public resource, and must also be "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory." And they must be "publicly disclosed" by governments, so that they are transparent to the public and to carriers. These phrases are not specifically defined in the Act or the Commission's Rules. By clarifying them, the Commission will prevent excessive and discriminatory rights of way charges from impeding the deployment of critically needed wireless services, which soon will include 5G technologies. It will thus promote Congress's broader goal of accelerating deployment of ubiquitous wireless broadband services.

For all of these reasons, the Commission should exercise its authority to interpret Section 253(c) to fulfill that provision's core purpose and expedite the deployment of wireless broadband services that will reach all Americans.<sup>10</sup> It should declare that:

- "Fair and reasonable compensation" means charges for rights of way application and access fees that enable a locality to recoup the costs reasonably related to reviewing and issuing permits and managing the rights of way. Additional charges or those not related to actual use of the right of way, such as fees based on carriers' revenues, are unlawful.
- "Competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory" means charges imposed on a
  provider for access to rights of way that do not exceed the charges imposed on
  other providers for similar access. Higher charges are discriminatory and
  therefore unlawful.
- Localities must disclose to a provider seeking access to rights of way the charges that they previously assessed on others for access.

# II. NEW WIRELESS BROADBAND TECHNOLOGIES DEPEND ON REASONABLE AND NONDISCRIMINATORY CHARGES FOR ACCESS TO RIGHTS OF WAY.

# A. Access to Rights of Way Enables Robust Wireless Deployment.

The core public policy objective that rights of way serve – to enable the deployment of services which benefit the public – is particularly applicable to wireless services. For a number of reasons, rights of way have become an indispensable component of wireless infrastructure planning, investment and deployment. *First*, they enable companies to build reliable networks with increased capacity to serve all customers given that most people live and work adjacent to a street or highway. Rights of way are also the key to expanding the availability of robust broadband to all Americans. *Second*, the significant increases in demand for 4G services are requiring wireless carriers to "densify" their networks by installing what are estimated to be hundreds of thousands and potentially millions of additional sites. Rights of way are the optimal (if not the only) way to deploy the many new sites that are needed to serve customers. *Third*, rights of way also are essential locations for backhaul and transport, which rely on a combination of wireless and fiber facilities and thus need access to streets and highways. *Fourth*, using rights

of way reduces the transaction costs providers incur to negotiate with private landowners for access to individual buildings, which can involve hundreds of different leases across a geographic area. Lower costs translate directly into more investment, faster deployment, and more robust competition. These benefits are, as explained below, becoming even more critical for further expansion of wireless broadband and the deployment of 5G technologies.

In 2011 the Commission adopted a *Notice of Inquiry* "concern[ing] key challenges and best practices in expanding the reach and reducing the cost of broadband deployment by improving government policies for access to rights of way and wireless facilities siting." It acknowledged the link between expanding broadband and securing affordable rights of way access, and sought comment on such questions as the following: "To what extent and in what circumstances are rights of way or wireless facilities siting charges reasonable? . . . Are there instances and circumstances in which rights of way or facilities siting charges are unreasonable? What are the appropriate criteria for determining the reasonableness of such charges?" While parties submitted data on the high and discriminatory fees some localities were requiring them to pay before they could deploy new infrastructure, the Commission did not take further action.

The Commission should now answer these questions. In fact, the issues it foresaw in 2011 are growing increasingly urgent given the rapidly growing demand for mobile broadband, the need

for much denser cell sites, and the corresponding need for backhaul and transport networks to support them.

# B. Wireless Technologies Need Affordable Access to Rights of Way Now More than Ever to Achieve Our Goals for Broadband and 5G Global Leadership.

On a bipartisan basis, federal telecommunications policy has been designed to increase the availability of wireless broadband (including 5G) to meet the needs of all Americans. As Commissioner Pai has said, "In order for the U.S. to continue to lead the world in wireless, we must stay focused on ensuring that providers large and small can install the antennas and other physical facilities necessary to serve American consumers on the move." And Commissioner Clyburn has stated, "America will only truly win the 5G race if all of our citizens benefit, and it is my sincere hope as we strive to ensure competitive opportunities that we deliver ubiquitous rewards to everyone."

Networks to support small cells such as the ones Mobilitie is constructing will be a cornerstone of 5G deployment. To take advantage of these opportunities, however, the Commission must eliminate barriers to wireless infrastructure deployment. As Chairman Wheeler has observed:

[T]he nature of 5G technology doesn't just mean more antenna sites, it also means that *without* such sites the benefits of 5G may be sharply diminished. In the pre-5G world, fending off sites from the immediate neighborhood didn't necessarily mean sacrificing the advantages of obtaining service from a distant cell site. With the anticipated 5G architecture, that would appear to be less feasible, perhaps much less feasible. Furthermore, the nature of the technology makes the review and approval by community siting authorities, and the associated costs and fees, all the more critical. There are just over 200,000 cell towers in the U.S., but there

may be millions of small cell sites in the 5G future. If siting for a small cell takes as long and costs as much as siting for a cell tower, few communities will ever have the benefits of 5G. 15

Commissioner Pai has sounded this same concern:

Future 5G technologies will require "densification" of wireless networks. That means providers are going to deploy hundreds of thousands of new antennas and cell sites, and they are going to deploy many more miles of fiber to carry all of this traffic. Without a paradigm shift in our nation's approach to wireless siting and broadband deployment, our creaky regulatory approach is going to be the bottleneck that holds American consumers and businesses back. The upshot of all this is that we need to make it easier for ISPs to build, maintain, and upgrade their networks—and ultimately make broadband more affordable and accessible to all Americans. <sup>16</sup>

Commissioner O'Rielly has also noted that, "[t]o ensure timely and cost-effective 5G deployment, the Commission must be prepared to step in and move the siting process forward by using the existing authority provided by Congress, and affirmed by the courts, to hold localities accountable for their review processes and ultimate decisions." And Commissioner Clyburn recently stated: "Lack of affordability remains one of the larger barriers to connected communities in this country . . . . Streamlining deployment is central to this effort. We must ensure that all providers are able to deploy and upgrade their infrastructure at the lowest cost and quickest pace." 18

Recent statistics justify these concerns. According to Cisco's most current VNI Mobile Forecast with respect to the United States:

- mobile data traffic will grow six-fold from 2015 to 2020, a compound annual growth rate of 42%;
- mobile data traffic will grow two times faster than U.S. fixed IP traffic from 2015 to 2020;
- mobile data traffic in 2020 will be equivalent to six times the volume of the entire U.S. Internet in 2005; and
- the average mobile connection speed will double from 2015 to 2020, reaching 16 Mbps in 2020. <sup>19</sup>

The staggering growth in traffic will eventually outpace network capacity, absent the further densification of networks made possible by billions of dollars in investment to build new infrastructure in local communities across the country. Greatly increased backhaul and transport capacity, as well as "last-mile" capacity through additional cell sites, is critical. As Commissioner Rosenworcel noted in supporting the Commission's allocation of new spectrum bands for 5G, "While these superhigh signals carry a significant amount of data, they don't go far. But we can turn this limitation into a strength by combining these frequencies with small cells packed close together, densifying networks at lower cost. This all works – if we come up with policies and practices that facilitate small cell deployment." <sup>20</sup>

Rights of way are ideal – but also essential – for small cell and 5G technologies, as well as for the backhaul and transport facilities that connect them to all carriers' networks, allowing customers to enjoy nationwide connectivity. Much like mobile devices, wireless infrastructure is evolving toward extremely small equipment that can easily be located on streetlights and utility poles that already occupy rights of way, as well as on structures supporting signage and traffic control equipment. The reduced size and weight of small cell equipment generally does not pose loading problems for most rights of way structures. Many types of small cell antennas extend no more than a few feet in any direction; some are now nearly as small as a laptop.

Access to rights of way is also more essential for small cells and the transmission facilities that connect them than it has been for 3G and 4G macrocells. The higher-frequency radio spectrum bands that carriers will increasingly depend on for small cells and 5G can supply needed network capacity. However, these bands' propagation limitations require more closely-spaced infrastructure. There is often no practical way to deploy this infrastructure without using public rights of way. And every small cell site must be connected to networks through backhaul and transport facilities so that customers can send and receive communications to or from anywhere. Given the enormous capacity demands being placed on networks, fiber may be the only cost-effective choice in urban areas. Fiber supplies the bandwidth needed to accommodate explosive data growth for many years, avoiding the need to repeatedly install new conduit. But installing fiber is not technically feasible or financially viable without access to rights of way. If carriers and infrastructure providers are charged exorbitant rents or fees for that access, fiber deployment will be deterred.

In short, robust and ubiquitously available wireless broadband depends on affordable access to rights of way. By granting this petition, the Commission will give force to the core purpose of Section 253. And it will prevent excessive fees that are impeding providers from building the infrastructure that will help make wireless broadband for all Americans a reality.

# C. High and Discriminatory Fees Are Impeding Deployment of Infrastructure Needed to Support Wireless Broadband.

Mobilitie and other providers are spearheading the wireless industry's expansion of network capacity to accommodate ever-growing customer demands for advanced technologies. These companies pay enormous up-front costs to construct and expand their networks, long before they can generate revenues from those networks. The economics of deployment are, however, made far more difficult when localities impose excessive fees as a precondition for

deployment. As Commissioner O'Rielly stated at the Commission's May 3, 2016 workshop, "I continue to hear legitimate complaints about localities placing hurdles in front of small cell deployments. Issues range from permitting problems and excessive fees to forced tolling agreements and *de facto* moratoria. Site approvals in rights-of-way, which are especially important for small cell systems, appear to be particularly problematic." In recent testimony to Congress, he expanded on his concerns:

One area that the Commission, and perhaps Congress, can provide greater assistance is removing barriers to the wireless infrastructure necessary to deploy 5G. As I have previously outlined, experts estimate that the propagation capabilities (short distances) will require a ten-fold or greater siting of wireless towers and antennas. Some have argued that we may see a million new small cells and DAS antennas deployed in the next five years. All of this infrastructure can't be sited without approval of decision makers, including private land owners and municipal managers.

Standing in the way of progress, however, are some localities, Tribal governments and states seeking to extract enormous fees from providers and operating siting review processes that are not conducive to a quick and successful deployment schedule. At some point, the Commission may need to exert authority provided by Congress to preempt the activities of those delaying 5G deployment without justifiable reasons.<sup>22</sup>

Mobilitie's experience validates these concerns. It holds authorizations from state public utility commissions nationwide to provide telecommunications services, and has filed thousands of applications for permits or franchises in nearly all 50 states. Those applications cover tens of thousands of individual sites to be located in rights of way that include antennas, fiber, electric power supply, and other equipment. Some localities recognize the public interest benefits in

granting Mobilitie affordable access to rights of way to bring advanced services to their residents. These communities have worked cooperatively with Mobilitie and charge reasonable fees. For example, Mobilitie has concluded rights of way agreements with small up-front or annual fees ranging from \$80 to \$750 with the cities of Los Angeles and Anaheim, California; Minneapolis, Minnesota; Overland Park and Olathe, Kansas; Independence, Missouri; Newark and Union City, New Jersey; Bismarck, North Dakota; Price, Utah; and Racine and Wauwatosa, Wisconsin.

Many other localities are, however, requesting multiple, exorbitant fees that unlawfully discriminate against wireless technology and impair new or improved service. In Mobilitie's experience, these fees are orders of magnitude higher than what other localities charge – even ten times as much – and also far exceed a locality's charges to defray its reasonable costs of processing permit applications and managing its rights of way. Mobilitie believes these fees are materially higher than what other rights of way users have been charged, although, as discussed below, information as to what other users are paying is difficult to obtain.<sup>23</sup>

These high charges are particularly unjustified because equipment for new wireless technologies is often *less* intrusive than equipment for older wireline or wireless services. The regulatory approval process for these types of new wireless facilities should be faster and *less* burdensome, not slower and more expensive.

Commentators have noted the growing problem of high rights of way fees and have asked the Commission to address it:

Many LGUs [local government units] have recognized that communications are a beneficial service and crucial for economic development and, thus, they have allowed carriers to occupy the PROW [public rights of way] in return for one time permit charges or similar fees that are limited to recovering the cost of PROW management and maintenance. Other LGUs have seen the opportunity for a large and continuous revenue source, and they have used their monopoly control over the PROW to extract large fees that are used to subsidize other LGU services.<sup>24</sup>

Noting that broadband is "becoming an essential service" and that both "the Bush and Obama administrations have established accelerated broadband deployment as a national priority," this analysis concluded that high rights of way charges interfere with that priority: "To upgrade and build out their networks, carriers naturally need increased access to the PROW. LGUs that seek to subsidize other government services by charging revenue generating PROW fees are a formidable obstacle to that goal."

"Given the importance of ubiquitous expansion of 4G and the rollout of 5G to our economic future, it's not reasonable for localities to view cell site deployment as a potential new revenue stream, which is something we've seen." The problem is not confined to a few outlier localities – it exists nationwide. Across the country, Mobilitie is being confronted with multiple fees, often being asked to pay not only up-front fees but also annual recurring fees which escalate by mandatory amounts year after year. Worse, cities are requesting these fees not only for new poles or for attachments to city-owned light poles, but also where Mobilitie would install its equipment on a private utility's poles, even though there is no cost to the city from that installation and no new use of its rights of way. Types of fees include:

Application fees. Localities seek up-front fees to process any permit applications while reserving discretion to deny any or all permits. These fees are typically in the \$1,000 - \$3,000 range but can be far higher. For example, a Minnesota locality demanded a \$10,000 up-front processing fee and a California city requested an \$8,000 "administration fee," but neither locality explained how it calculated this amount or how it possibly reflected costs to process the application. These fees are problematic because they often are not in lieu of per-pole or per-site fees but are instead in addition to them, further driving up carriers' up-front costs.

Annual per-pole fees. In addition, every locality is seeking a separate fee for each and every facility Mobilitie constructs. These fees do not serve to compensate the city for processing Mobilitie's applications because those costs will already be recouped through the up-front application fees. Localities do not explain or justify annual per-pole fees as compensating them for the management of the rights of way, supervision of Mobilitie's operation, or other ongoing costs. Instead, the fees appear to be set to recover what localities believe the "market" rate is for the use of their rights of way so that they can profit from it. This results in huge variations in what Mobilitie is being asked to pay from city to city. And, because cities typically demand that the first year's fee be paid as a condition of granting a permit to construct a site, Mobilitie must pay the fee long before it can generate any revenues from its use. By adding to Mobilitie's up-front costs, these fees make the financial case for expanding service even more difficult.

Examples of such high fees include:

- A Wisconsin city has requested annual fees of \$30,000 for each pole.
- Two Oregon cities have requested payments of \$6,083 and \$5,000 annually for each pole.
- One California city initially proposed annual fees of \$14,000 per pole. When Mobilitie objected the city reduced the fees to \$4,000, justifying that number because a nearby city had charged \$4,000. This pricing behavior signals that cities are setting fees not to

- compensate them for managing the rights of way, but to collect as much as other cities are receiving or as much as the market can bear.
- Two other California cities are demanding annual fees of \$10,800 and \$7,210 per pole respectively.
- A Texas locality requested a \$20,000 annual per-pole fee for new poles. Mobilitie proposed a lower amount but the city refused to accept it, forcing Mobilitie to limit its planned deployment to attaching equipment to existing poles. Even for simple attachments the city is demanding \$2,000 annually for each pole, even where the attachment would require no disturbance of the underlying right of way.
- An Illinois jurisdiction is requesting a \$12,000 annual per-pole fee.
- A New York locality imposed a blanket fee of \$45,000 per year that is not tied to the number of poles Mobilitie constructs and thus bears no relationship to actual use of the rights of way.

It bears emphasis that these and other charges localities demand are "unit" fees, which must be paid for *each* small cell site. But small cell deployments may require dozens or even hundreds of sites to provide needed capacity and coverage, meaning that these fees skyrocket. A \$5,000 per-site fee for a 100-site deployment translates into \$500,000 in fees per year.

The magnitude of many rights of way fees materially impacts the economics of small cell and backhaul deployment, because those fees are so high in relation to other buildout costs and comprise a large percentage of those costs. The harmful impact of these fees is compounded because they are recurring fees that must be paid to the locality every year, meaning that over time they can far exceed all other deployment costs. Depending on the type of equipment used, the installation of a new pole can cost from \$15,000 to \$30,000. With some localities imposing per-site permit application fees of several thousand dollars, plus annual fees in that range as well, up-front fees can comprise 20-30 percent or more of total construction costs. But those up-front fees only are part of the payments Mobilitie must make. Because it typically also must pay the per-pole fee every year – and that fee is almost always subject to mandatory annual percentage

escalations – the financial burden that local fees impose is exacerbated. Thus, for example, an annual \$3,000 fee will cost well more than \$30,000 for *each* installation over ten years, which can far exceed the entire costs of deployment. Such fees can make deployment financially nonviable, effectively preventing deployment of new service.

Percentage-of-revenues fees. Other localities demand that Mobilitie pay a percentage of its annual gross revenues, with required fees as high as six and seven percent (requested by localities in Oregon and Washington). Jurisdictions in California, Massachusetts, and New York, as well as other jurisdictions in Oregon, are requesting that Mobilitie pay them five percent of its gross annual revenues. These fees, which can exceed what localities can charge cable providers under federal law, by definition bear no relationship to Mobilitie's actual use of the rights of way. Such a substantial tax directly affects Mobilitie's ability to finance projects in those communities.

Fiber fees. Where Mobilitie seeks to lay Ethernet or other fiber in rights of way to transport traffic from its pole-based equipment to carriers' core networks, cities also request a per-foot fee. These fees vary tremendously. While some jurisdictions in states including Kansas, New York, Minnesota and Utah charge fees ranging from \$0.19 to \$1.08 per foot per year, other cities are requesting per-foot charges orders of magnitude higher. For example, several Texas cities have sought fiber fees based on the fair market value of adjacent private property – even though they would not be granting Mobilitie any title or other private property rights that property owners enjoy. Such "fair market value" fees drive up the costs of fiber to prohibitive levels, deterring the deployment of new fiber capacity needed to accommodate growing broadband traffic.

Third-party manager fees. Some localities are entering into exclusive contracts with private companies to manage their rights of way. Some of these firms compete with other companies deploying network infrastructure. Under these arrangements, the private manager is empowered to negotiate rent and other fees from carriers and keep a share of the profits. This practice results in fees that by definition do not only compensate the city but also pay a private party, without any relationship to Mobilitie's actual use of the rights of way. Chairman Wheeler has criticized this growing practice: "It's not reasonable for cities to 'franchise' their siting to a third party, who acts as a gatekeeper."

The plethora of different and often multiple fees demonstrates that many localities are using their authority to manage rights of way as a pretext for raising revenue, regardless of Section 253(c)'s mandate for "fair and reasonable compensation" that is "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory." And, because these fees must be paid in advance, they are particularly burdensome for a new entrant such as Mobilitie, who must pay them in addition to fronting the costs of equipment and construction, long before it can expect to generate revenue. This often creates an untenable situation that leaves Mobilitie with the dilemma of acceding to a municipality's unreasonable demands or not deploying in that municipality at all. These profit-generating regimes also frustrate the Commission's efforts to accelerate broadband deployment and foster the entry and growth of new competitive services.

## III. A DECLARATORY RULING WILL ACHIEVE SECTION 253(c)'S OBJECTIVES BY CLARIFYING ITS APPLICATION TO RIGHTS OF WAY CHARGES.

#### A. The Commission's Clarification of Section 253(c) Is Needed Now.

In the Telecommunications Act of 1996, Congress directed the FCC to promote rapid deployment of telecommunications services and promote competition by outlawing state and local requirements that deter the deployment of those services. Section 253(a) provides, "No State or local statute or regulation, or other State or local legal requirement, may prohibit or have the effect of prohibiting the ability of any entity to provide any interstate or intrastate telecommunications service." While Section 253(c) preserves the rights of municipalities to charge access fees for their rights of way, those rights are expressly limited:

Nothing in this section affects the authority of a State or local government to manage the public right-of-way or to require fair and reasonable compensation from telecommunications providers, on a competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory basis, for use of public rights-of-way on a nondiscriminatory basis, if the compensation required is publicly disclosed by such government.

Thus Section 253(c) requires that any charges localities impose must be limited to "fair and reasonable compensation" and be imposed "on a competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory basis." The charges described above clearly violate Congress' directive because they are not tied in any way to actual costs of issuing permits and managing rights of way. Instead they confirm that localities are leveraging their control over the public streets to raise revenues and profit from that control – precisely the incentive to impose "artificially high rates" that courts have invalidated. 29

Given the vital importance of new wireless infrastructure to achieving the national policy objective of universal broadband availability, and the threat that unreasonable and discriminatory charges pose to that objective, the Commission should provide guidance on how Section 253(c) applies to rights of way charges.<sup>30</sup> To facilitate the nationwide deployment of densified infrastructure in rights of way, the Commission should lay down "markers" that will provide more certainty to localities and carriers as to what charges Section 253(c) does and does not allow. Guidance will yield significant benefits:

- It will help to stop localities from imposing charges designed not to cover costs but to profit from the public's growing demand for more and faster wireless services.
- It will resolve many of the controversies over charges that have delayed infrastructure deployment and consumed resources of localities and carriers. Both will benefit from Commission guidance that sets metes and bounds for those charges.
- A mandate from the Commission can have broad, national impact, providing clarity to all affected parties. It is a far more efficient and effective remedy than case-by-case adjudications and better fits the national need for prompt action.
- It will provide guidance to courts when they adjudicate claims that localities have violated the requirements of Section 253.

#### B. A Declaratory Ruling Is the Right Course to Provide the Needed Guidance.

A declaratory ruling clarifying the application of Section 253(c) would square with Commission precedent. Historically the Commission has issued declaratory rulings to provide interested parties with guidance as to their respective obligations under the Act or the Commission's rules, particularly where conflicting interpretations or other factors have created uncertainty. Declaratory rulings efficiently provide certainty to all affected parties across the

entire country, rather than the piecemeal approach of court adjudications. For example, the Commission issued a declaratory ruling to "clarify statutory rights under Section 251 of the [Act], in light of apparently conflicting determinations in several states." In another declaratory ruling the Commission noted that guidance "would be helpful to avoid future disputes." Courts have also specifically noted the Commission's particular role in interpreting Section 253.<sup>33</sup>

The Commission has also issued declaratory rulings interpreting the Act and its rules as they apply to other wireless facilities siting issues, and grounded its action each time on achieving its goal to foster new wireless services. In 2006 it granted a petition for declaratory ruling that an airport authority's restrictions on the deployment of wireless access points was preempted by the agency's "OTARD" rule, which is intended to promote the deployment of those antennas to improve service to the public.<sup>34</sup> And in 2009 the Commission issued a declaratory ruling interpreting language in Section 332(c)(7) of the Act to impose "shot clocks" for local zoning action on wireless siting applications. That ruling was designed to "promote[]

the deployment of broadband and other wireless services by reducing delays in the construction and improvement of wireless networks."<sup>35</sup>

To date, the Commission has not defined what types of rights of way access fees qualify under Section 253(c) as "just and reasonable compensation" or "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory," or how they should be "publicly disclosed" by governments that impose them. Clarifying Section 253(c)'s application to rights of way charges will prevent disputes that frustrate and delay necessary investments in wireless broadband and 5G. As Commissioner Pai recently stated:

[T]he FCC must aggressively use its statutory authority to ensure that local governments don't stand in the way of broadband deployment. In section 253 of the Communications Act, for example, Congress gave the Commission the express authority to preempt any state or local regulation that prohibits or has the effect of prohibiting the ability of any entity to provide wired or wireless service. So where states or localities are imposing fees that are not "fair and reasonable" for access to local rights of way, the FCC should preempt them. Where local ordinances erect barriers to broadband deployment (especially as applied to new entrants), the FCC should eliminate them. And where local governments are not transparent about their application processes, the FCC should require some sunlight. These processes need to be public and streamlined.<sup>36</sup>

# IV. THE COMMISSION SHOULD INTERPRET SECTION 253(c) TO ACHIEVE CONGRESS'S OBJECTIVE OF REASONABLE, NONDISCRIMINATORY, RIGHTS OF WAY FEES.

To prevent excessive and discriminatory fees from deterring investment and forestalling deployment of advanced wireless infrastructure, and to provide more certainty to governments and carriers as to what constitutes lawful compensation, the Commission should adopt the following three interpretations of Section 253(c):

## A. "Just and Reasonable Compensation" Is Appropriately Limited to a Locality's Cost of Managing its Rights of Way.

The Commission should first declare that the phrase "fair and reasonable compensation" means charges that enable a locality to recoup its reasonable costs to review and issue permits and manage its rights of way, and that additional charges are unlawful. A locality could, for example, collect a one-time fee to recover the personnel and other costs for reviewing a carrier's application for a permit or franchise to construct facilities in its rights of way. Similarly, a fee that covers the costs to supervise the construction of facilities for compliance with the terms and conditions of the permit, local building codes, liability insurance, or street excavation regulations would be reasonable. And a locality may collect recurring rental or access fees that cover its incremental personnel and other costs for monitoring the facilities (for example, to ensure they are maintained in compliance with signage and other requirements).

The Commission should declare, however, that additional charges that exceed these costs are unlawful. Thus, a locality's one-time and recurring charges and fees cannot be set at levels that are designed to raise revenues for the locality, because those charges would allow the locality to profit from its exclusive control of rights of way. Localities should not be able to seize on the nation's urgent need for a huge investment in wireless infrastructure as a new source of revenue.

The language, purpose and legislative history of Section 253 support limiting total compensation from all fees to those that are related to a locality's costs. Congress's use of the term "compensation" rather than, for example, "payments," reflects that permissible charges are only those necessary to "compensate" the locality for its costs of managing the rights of way.<sup>37</sup>

This conclusion fits Section 253's purpose – to promote new telecom services by removing barriers (including unreasonable charges) to telecom carriers, while preserving localities' right to manage their rights of way. Allowing localities to recoup the costs to manage – but not to profit from – rights of way would fulfill the statute's objective. Conversely, allowing localities to charge whatever the market will bear would eviscerate the statutory limits.

The legislative history of Section 253(c) is consistent with determining that "fair and reasonable compensation" means fees that are related to a locality's costs. During the floor debate on this section, Senator Feinstein gave examples of the limited types of activities that localities could conduct, including "requir[ing] a company to pay fees to recover an appropriate share of the increased street repair and paving costs that result from repeated excavation."

Nowhere did she indicate that fees could be imposed more broadly or simply to collect new revenues.<sup>38</sup>

This interpretation does not require the Commission to specify dollar caps or other quantitative limits on what localities can charge. Localities have varying processes for reviewing rights of way use applications, overseeing the construction of facilities, and monitoring carriers' ongoing use. Their costs of managing rights of way access and use thus vary. But the magnitude of the variation is likely to be small – and far smaller than extreme variations that currently exist. Commission guidance that provides more certainty as to permissible costs will translate into faster and more robust investment.

This ruling will also provide needed guidance to federal courts, which have adopted different approaches to determining when a locality's charges are "fair and reasonable." Many courts have held that rights of way fees cannot be set at a level designed to raise revenues, but must be tied to the locality's costs of managing its rights of way. For example, in *AT&T*Communications of the Southwest, Inc. v. City of Dallas, 39 Dallas attempted to charge AT&T a franchise fee equal to 4% of its gross receipts for television operations in the city. The court found that this fee was "in no way tied to AT&T's use of City rights-of-way,"40 and that "any fee that is not based on AT&T's use of City rights-of-way violates Section 253(a) of the [1996]
Telecom Act] as an economic barrier to entry."41

Similarly, in *Bell Atlantic-Maryland, Inc. v. Prince George's County*, <sup>42</sup> the court rejected the county's attempt to impose a "right of way charge" equal to 3% of a rights of way user's gross revenues. It held that "the proper benchmark is the cost to the county of maintaining and improving the right of way that the carrier actually uses." <sup>43</sup> The court explained its reasoning as follows:

The crucial point . . . is that any franchise fees that local governments impose on telecommunications companies must be directly related to the companies' use of the local rights-of-way, otherwise the fees constitute an unlawful economic barrier under Section 253(a). . . . For the same reason, the court also believes that local governments may not set their franchise fees above a level that is reasonably calculated to compensate them for the costs of administering their franchise programs and of maintaining and improving their public rights-of-way. Franchise fees thus may not serve as general revenue-raising measures.

... If local governments were permitted under Section 253(c) to charge franchise fees that were unrelated either to a telecommunications company's use of the public rights-of-way or to a local government's costs of maintaining and improving its rights-of-way, then local governments could effectively thwart the [1996 Telecom Act's] pro-competition mandate and make a nullity out of Section 253(a). Congress could not have intended such a result.<sup>44</sup>

In XO Missouri, Inc. v. City of Maryland Heights, 45 local rights of way users were initially required to pay an annual license fee equal to the greater of the fee established by the city or 5% of the user's gross revenues. Here again, the court found that the city had not met the "just and reasonable compensation" standard in Section 253(c):

The Court adopts the reasoning supporting other courts' decisions that revenue-based fees are impermissible under the [1996 Telecom Act]. Thus, to meet the definition of "fair and reasonable compensation" a fee charged by a municipality must be directly related to the actual costs incurred by the municipality when a telecommunications provider makes use of the rights-of-way. . . . [P]lainly a fee that does more than make a municipality whole is not compensatory in the literal sense, and instead risks becoming an economic barrier to entry. 46

In Puerto Rico Telephone Company, Inc. v. Municipality of Guayanilla, <sup>47</sup> the First Circuit similarly rejected a Guayanilla, Puerto Rico ordinance that imposed a five percent gross revenue fee on telecommunications providers for their use of the municipality's public rights of way.

Again, the relationship between the fee and the municipality's costs was the linchpin of the court's analysis:

We need not decide whether fees imposed on telecommunications providers by state and local government must be *limited* to cost recovery. We agree with the district court's reasoning that fees should be, at the very least, *related* to the actual use of rights of way and that "the costs [of maintaining those rights of way] are an essential part of the equation." . . . As the district court noted in this case, "[a]bsent evidence of costs, the Court cannot determine whether the Ordinance results in fair and reasonable compensation as opposed to monopolistic pricing." 48

The First Circuit noted that fees carriers pay to localities often represent a one-for-one loss of dollars that otherwise could be used for beneficial network investment. It also found that "market-based" pricing was not consistent with Section 253(c): "The amount that other telecommunications carriers would be willing to pay tells us more about telecommunications providers' resources and their desire to comply with local regulations than it does about why the fee chosen is "fair and reasonable compensation for the state or municipality."

Other courts have considered various factors in addition to the locality's costs. In *TCG*Detroit v. City of Dearborn, the Sixth Circuit approved a 4% gross revenue fee after examining 
"the extent of the use contemplated, the amount other telecommunications providers would be 
willing to pay, and the impact on the profitability of the business." In Qwest Corporation v.

City of Santa Fe, 51 the Tenth Circuit struck down a city's fee structure that sought to capture the 
right of way's fair market value. While it noted that courts were split on whether fees must be

cost-based or could include other factors, it found the city's fees violated Section 253 because they were not cost-based and did not meet the Sixth Circuit's test, as enunciated in the *TCG*Detroit case. Another court has noted the varying approaches to determining when a right of way fee is fair and reasonable:

Some courts have found that the fairness and reasonableness of a franchise fee under section 253(c) depends upon a rough proportion between the fee and the extent of the use of the public right-of-way, fees other providers have been willing to pay, and the negotiating history of the parties. . . . Others, more persuasively in this Court's view, read "fair and reasonable compensation" to limit municipalities to recoupment of costs directly incurred through the use of the public right-of-way. <sup>52</sup>

The courts' different approaches make the Commission's interpretive guidance particularly timely and important. By clarifying that localities may recover their reasonable costs to review and approve siting permits and to manage the rights of way, the Commission will provide more certainty to localities and carriers alike as to what fees are permissible, and thereby head off disputes that might otherwise land in court.<sup>53</sup> It also will ensure that localities can recoup their legitimate costs, while stopping efforts to impose excessive fees that hinder wireless deployment.

Commentators have long urged the Commission to limit rights of way fees to stop localities from charging whatever they can exact from carriers. After reviewing the language and purpose of Section 253(c), one article concluded that the provision "limits municipal taxes

related to right-of-way use by telecommunications companies to regulatory costs."<sup>54</sup> Ten years later, another article noted that "courts have continuously struggled over the definition of fair and reasonable compensation," and urged the Commission to seize "the opportunity to end these inconsistent interpretations and restore Section 253 to its rightful role in the process of ensuring a fair field of play for all competitors."<sup>55</sup> It concluded:

The role of government as expressed through Section 253 is to ensure that competitors meet on fair and balanced playing fields so that the best technologies and competitive strategies have the greatest opportunities to prevail. A level playing field exists when all firms pay for the actual costs they cause. Revenue-generating fees tilt the field of play and put [localities] in the position of picking winners and losers, which is the antithesis of Section 253 and the [Communications Act]. 56

The Commission should also declare that Section 253(c) does not permit fees which are based on a percentage of revenues. First, those fees are by definition not tied to a locality's costs – rather, they impose a tax based on revenues. Where a city imposes, for example, a five percent gross revenues fee, a provider with \$10 million in revenues would pay an annual fee of \$500,000 – whether it deploys one pole or 100 poles, or whether it deploys one mile of fiber or ten miles. Equally anomalous, a different provider with far lower revenues may use far more of the city's rights of way yet pay far less. Revenues-based fees thus fail Section 253's requirement that fees

must be "reasonable compensation ... for use of public rights of way," because the amount of the fee does not relate to actual occupation of those rights of way.<sup>57</sup>

The Commission has doubted the legality of revenues-based fees. In *TCG New York*,

Inc. v. City of White Plains, <sup>58</sup> the Second Circuit struck down a five percent of gross revenues fee imposed on a new carrier as unlawfully discriminatory because the fee had not been imposed on an incumbent carrier. In an amicus brief to the court, the Commission agreed that the city's fee was unlawfully discriminatory, but also questioned its validity under the "fair and reasonable compensation" language of Section 253(c):

The FCC and the United States note that a percentage of gross revenues-based fee, even if it were applied to all users of the City's rights-of-way, would still be problematic under Section 253(c)... A percentage of gross revenues-based fee, even if uniformly applied, might well have no relationship to either the extent of each carrier's use of the rights-of-way or the costs it imposed on the municipality. ... Although the FCC has not addressed the specific issue, there also is serious question whether a gross revenues fee is "fair and reasonable compensation ... for use of public rights of way" within the meaning of section 253(c). <sup>59</sup>

## B. Localities Must Assess Nondiscriminatory Charges for Similar Access to Rights of Way.

Section 253(c) also prohibits right of way charges that are not "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory." Nearly two decades ago, the Commission stated:

One clear message from section 253 is that when a local government chooses to exercise its authority to manage the public rights-of-way or to require fair and reasonable compensation from telecommunications providers, it must do so on a competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory basis. Local requirements imposed only on the operations of new entrants and not on existing operations of

incumbents are quite likely to be neither competitively neutral nor nondiscriminatory. <sup>60</sup>

The Commission should reinforce this decision by declaring that "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory" means charges imposed on a provider for access to rights of way that do not exceed the charges that were imposed on other providers for similar access to the rights of way. Higher charges would be unlawful. If, for example, a provider were granted access to a city's streets to install poles and other equipment without an up-front permit or other charge, the city's imposition of such a charge on a new entrant would be presumptively discriminatory. If the provider were charged a certain recurring annual fee for each pole it constructs or occupies, charging a higher fee for a new entrant would also be presumptively discriminatory.

Mobilitie is not seeking a ruling that all differences in charges are *per se* unlawful. A finding of discrimination must be grounded in a comparison of the relevant charges and the reasons for them. Fees may legitimately vary where they cover dissimilar deployments, or where one deployment imposes materially greater burdens on a right of way than another. For example, a taller pole that requires more excavation for construction may require more extensive local review than a shorter pole. And different fees may be warranted when they cover different types of wireless equipment that impose different loading or excavation requirements. A locality should, however, be obligated to explain and justify any variation in its charges by showing why different facilities impose different costs on its management of rights of way.

Clarifying the phrase "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory" in this way will be consistent with court decisions, which have invalidated rights of way charges on a new telecommunications carrier that exceed charges imposed on other carriers. For example, as

noted above, in *TCG New York, Inc. v. City of White Plains*,<sup>61</sup> the Second Circuit struck down a requirement that plaintiffs pay a franchise fee equal to five percent of their gross revenue, even though the fee did not apply to the incumbent provider. The court concluded that Section 253(c) "forbids fees that are not competitively neutral, period, without regard to the municipality's intent."<sup>62</sup> It explained its rationale for striking down the fee:

From an economics perspective, whether fees are competitively neutral should be determined based on future costs of providing services, not sunk costs incurred in the past, because that is the playing field on which the competition will take place . . . If TCG is required to pay five percent of its gross revenues to the City and [the incumbent] is not, competitive neutrality is undermined. [The incumbent] will have the advantage of choosing to either undercut TCG's prices or to improve its profit margin relative to TCG's profit margin. Allowing White Plains to strengthen the competitive position of the incumbent service provider would run directly contrary to the pro-competitive goals of the [1996 Telecom Act]. 63

In a recent case, *Zayo Group, LLC v. Mayor and City Council of Baltimore*,<sup>64</sup> the city nearly tripled the plaintiffs' conduit fee to \$3.33 per linear foot (while the incumbent was only paying \$0.07 per linear foot to lease space under the public right of way). Moreover, the plaintiffs were forced to use the city's conduit and pay the associated fee (while the incumbent was permitted to own and operate its own conduit). The Court found that the plaintiffs had sufficiently pleaded facts showing that the City's increase in fees had a prohibitive effect on their

provision of telecommunications services and thus violated Section 253(a).<sup>65</sup> Turning to Section 253(c), the Court stated that "plaintiffs have pleaded sufficient facts showing that the City treated [the incumbent] and plaintiffs differently even though they were in the same telecommunications market."<sup>66</sup> Further, "because the City's alleged discrimination in favor of [the incumbent] may prevent 'rough parity' between competitors, plaintiffs have plausibly shown that the City's actions do not qualify for the § 253(c) safe harbor."<sup>67</sup>

To Mobilitie's knowledge, however, neither the Commission nor any court has addressed how Section 253(c)'s anti-discrimination mandate applies to *wireless* services. The Commission should do so now. Indeed, in some markets Mobilitie is paying far higher charges than other carriers – even though its facilities impose a smaller physical burden on the rights of way because they do not require overhead wires and incidental equipment required for wireline deployments. The Commission should adopt a declaratory ruling clarifying the application of Section 253(c) to discriminatory rights of way charges, and prohibiting charges that exceed those that were previously imposed on other carriers for similar rights of way access.

## C. Localities Should Disclose Their Charges on Other Carriers Which Were Given Rights of Way Access.

Section 253(c) imposes one additional pertinent requirement: It authorizes state and local governments to collect reasonable and nondiscriminatory charges for the use of their rights of way, "if the compensation required is publicly disclosed by such government." To give force to this language, as well as to the substantive limits on permissible compensation, the Commission

should declare that localities must at least disclose to a carrier upon request the charges they have imposed on all carriers for access to rights of way. That disclosure should include not only the amount of the charges but how they are calculated – for example, on a per-foot basis – and whether they are one-time or recurring.

Transparency in these charges is essential and in the public interest, as well as compelled by Section 253(c)'s language. All competing providers should be able to learn what charges localities have imposed over time for access to rights of way, and what have paid for particular types of access. For example, if a locality seeks to impose a license fee, it should disclose the amount of the fee and whether it previously assessed such a fee on other providers. If the locality seeks to impose a per-pole rental fee or other recurring charge, it should disclose whether it assessed that charge on others and if so the amount. When Mobilitie has been faced with high fees, it has often been unable to determine what the locality previously charged for access. As a result it has been forced to resort to burdensome and protracted requests under state and local Freedom of Information Act laws and ordinances, which impose a patchwork of different and time-consuming procedures. Even these efforts have rarely yielded pertinent data on rights of way charges imposed on others. The entire scheme of Section 253(c) is fundamentally dependent on providers' ability to know what these charges are and who pays them. There is no lawful or public interest basis for allowing a locality to avoid disclosing the amounts other providers paid for access, and conversely there is every reason why that information should be readily available.

#### V. CONCLUSION

The Commission should adopt a declaratory ruling interpreting and clarifying Section 253(c) as set forth above. Specifically, it should declare that:

- Fair and reasonable compensation" means charges for rights of way application and access fees that enable a locality to recoup the costs reasonably related to reviewing and issuing permits and managing the rights of way. Additional charges or those not related to actual use of the right of way, such as fees based on carriers' revenues, are unlawful.
- "Competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory" means charges imposed on a provider for access to rights of way that do not exceed the charges imposed on other providers for similar access. Higher charges are unlawful.
- Localities must disclose to a provider seeking access to rights of way the charges that they have previously assessed on others for access.

These rulings will advance the national priorities of increased and expanded broadband wireless and 5G network capabilities to meet the needs of all Americans.

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# COMMENT SOUGHT ON STREAMLINING DEPLOYMENT OF SMALL CELL INFRASTRUCTURE BY IMPROVING WIRELESS FACILITIES SITING POLICIES; MOBILITIE, LLC PETITION FOR DECLARATORY RULING

The Wireless Telecommunications Bureau (WTB) invites public input on potential Commission actions to help expedite the deployment next generation wireless infrastructure by providing guidance on how federal law applies to local government review of wireless facility siting applications and local requirements for gaining access to rights of way. This Public Notice seeks comment on ways in which the Commission could promote wireless infrastructure deployment by issuing a declaratory ruling, including but not limited to those suggested in a Petition for Declaratory Ruling filed by Mobilitie, LLC, on November 15, 2016.<sup>1</sup>

To satisfy consumers' rapidly growing demand for wireless broadband and other services, wireless companies are actively expanding the network capacity needed to maintain and improve the quality of existing services and to support the introduction of new technologies and services. In particular, many wireless providers are deploying small cells and distributed antenna systems (DAS) to meet localized needs for coverage and increased capacity in outdoor and indoor environments.<sup>2</sup> Although the facilities used in these networks are smaller and less obtrusive than traditional cell towers and antennas, they must be deployed more densely -i.e., in many more locations - to function effectively. As a result, local land-use authorities in many areas are facing substantial increases in the volume of siting

applications for deployment of these facilities.<sup>3</sup> This trend in infrastructure deployment is expected to continue, and even accelerate, as wireless providers begin rolling out 5G services.<sup>4</sup>

This creates a dilemma. We recognize, as did Congress in enacting Sections 253 and 332 of the Communications Act,<sup>5</sup> that localities play an important role in preserving local interests such as aesthetics and safety. At the same time, the Commission has a statutory mandate to facilitate the deployment of network facilities needed to deliver more robust wireless services to consumers throughout the United States.<sup>6</sup> It is our responsibility to ensure that this deployment of network facilities does not become subject to delay caused by unnecessarily time-consuming and costly siting review processes that may be in conflict with the Communications Act.

The Commission has regulatory tools to help resolve this dilemma. Sections 253 and 332(c)(7) of the Communications Act<sup>7</sup> and Section 6409(a) of the Spectrum Act<sup>8</sup> are designed, among other purposes, to remove barriers to deployment of wireless network facilities by hastening the review and approval of siting applications by local land-use authorities. The Commission has exercised its authority to interpret and implement these provisions by, among other things, clarifying the maximum presumptively reasonable time frames for review of siting applications and the criteria local governments may apply in deciding whether to approve them.<sup>9</sup> The Commission now has an opportunity to build on these actions by issuing a new declaratory ruling to further expedite the deployment of new network infrastructure that can give consumers across the country access to superior wireless services.

We are issuing this public notice to develop a factual record that will help us assess whether and to what extent the process of local land-use authorities' review of siting applications is hindering, or is likely to hinder, the deployment of wireless infrastructure. In turn, such a data-driven evaluation will make it possible to reach well-supported decisions on which further Commission actions, if any, would most effectively address any problem, while preserving local authorities' ability to protect interests within their purview. In the first section of this Public Notice, we summarize information gathered from public sources regarding new and emerging wireless technologies and services, and we discuss the progress of

deploying infrastructure needed to supply such services and satisfy consumer demand. We invite commenters to provide updated, corrected, or more detailed information on these issues. In the following sections, we discuss the applicable legal framework, including federal statutes, Commission rulings, and court decisions, as well as relevant state and local enactments and land-use authorities' decision-making on siting applications. We then discuss specific statutory interpretations on which we invite comment. We also generally seek comment on issues raised in Mobilitie's Petition for Declaratory Ruling.

### I. TECHNOLOGICAL AND LEGAL DEVELOPMENTS AFFECTING WIRELESS INFRASTRUCTURE DEPLOYMENT

#### A. Technological Developments

Current generation 3G and 4G services have fueled mobile wireless data consumption via smartphones, tablets and mobile-enabled PCs to the tune of 1.8 Exabytes<sup>10</sup> per month in 2016 in North America alone, and this consumption is expected to grow six fold by 2022, according to a report by Ericsson. 11 It also estimates that, on a per smartphone basis, mobile data traffic is expected to increase from 5.1 Gigabytes per month in 2016 to 25 Gigabytes by 2022. 12 This demand for mobile wireless data is expected to continue to grow even more with the proliferation of the Internet of Things (IoT), with an expected 400 million IoT devices connected to cellular networks by the end of 2016 and projected to grow to 1.5 billion devices by 2022, 13 made possible by advances in 4G services and next generation 5G services. While we cannot be sure exactly what 5G will bring, next generation services have the potential to revolutionize the mobile wireless experience by making the IoT widely available through the connection of billions of smart devices to the Internet. The ubiquitous connection of smart digital devices, particularly machine-to-machine connections such as sensors, wireless utility meters, industrial systems, home automation devices and appliances, connected cars, consumer electronics, and smart medical devices, <sup>14</sup> is expected to enable smart-city energy grids, safer transportation networks (including automated driving and in-vehicle services), mobile health care (devices that monitor human health and wellness), smart homes (with enhanced security and automation of household chores), smart factories (optimizing equipment and operations), and immersive entertainment (greatly enhanced resolution and virtual reality).

The Commission has repeatedly recognized the extraordinarily promising benefits of such 5G services and has acknowledged the need for deployment of small wireless facilities, <sup>15</sup> such as small cells

and DAS,<sup>16</sup> to enable providers to deliver those services to consumers. In order to improve spectrum efficiency, future 4G and 5G services will require significant densification of small wireless facilities, including DAS and small cells, so that these facilities, which serve smaller geographic areas, can be located close to end users to provide higher quality connections with higher bandwidth and lower latency.<sup>17</sup> For instance, in its recent order adopting service rules for four spectrum bands above 24 GHz in preparation for the transition to 5G services, the Commission acknowledged that these high spectrum bands "do not propagate well over long distances." Thus small wireless facilities are the kinds of technologies the Commission envisions needing to enable the 5G network in those bands. Because these cells are significantly smaller in coverage area than traditional macrocells, networks that incorporate such technologies can more intensely reuse scarce wireless frequencies, thus greatly increasing spectral efficiency and data capacity within the network footprint. For example, deploying ten small cells in a coverage area that could be served by a single macrocell could result in a tenfold increase in capacity while using the same quantity of spectrum. Such speed and capacity would require the construction and strategic placement of a large number of small cells, frequently placed close together to ensure each cell is shared by a small number of users.

To meet the growing demand, the wireless industry is currently deploying and planning for additional construction of a large number of small cells, and the number of these facilities is expected to grow rapidly over the next decade. <sup>22</sup> S&P Global Market Intelligence estimates that between 100,000 and

150,000 small cells will be constructed by the end of 2018, and that small cell deployments are expected to reach 455,000 by 2020 and nearly 800,000 by 2026.<sup>23</sup> AT&T has reported that the substantial majority of its infrastructure deployments over the next five years will be small cell sites.<sup>24</sup> In addition, Verizon is deploying small cells in several urban areas, including New York, Chicago, Atlanta, and San Francisco.<sup>25</sup> Sprint announced last year a goal of deploying 70,000 small cells within two years.<sup>26</sup>

#### B. Federal Statutory and Regulatory Framework

The successful deployment of wireless networks depends in large part on how quickly providers are able to obtain the necessary regulatory approvals.<sup>27</sup> As noted above, Congress enacted Sections 253 and 332 of the Communications Act, as well as Section 6409 of the Spectrum Act, *inter alia*, in order to address concerns about state and local governments' unduly restrictive zoning rules and unfounded denials or delays in the processing of permit applications for constructing wireless facilities.<sup>28</sup> These statutory provisions explicitly preserve state and local governments' authority to control the "placement, construction, and modification of personal wireless service facilities" and to manage "use of public rights-of-way," but they prohibit state and local governments from using certain unreasonable criteria in making such decisions.

Both Sections 253 and 332 prohibit state and local government actions that "prohibit or have the effect of prohibiting" any entity's ability to provide personal wireless service or any other telecommunications service or that "unreasonably discriminate among providers of functionally equivalent services." Section 253 expressly provides that state or local governments may require telecommunications providers to pay "compensation" for the use of public rights-of-way, but specifies that the amounts of such compensation must be "fair and reasonable," "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory," and "publicly disclosed." Section 253 also authorizes the Commission to issue orders that "preempt the enforcement" of state or local statutes, regulations, or legal requirements that preclude any entity from providing telecommunications service. In addition, many courts, relying on

their authority under the Constitution's Supremacy Clause and various jurisdictional statutes, have issued orders interpreting, and in some cases enjoining violations of, some or all provisions of Section 253.<sup>34</sup>

Section 332 requires state and local land-use authorities to act on requests for authority to place, construct, or modify personal wireless service facilities within a reasonable period of time after such requests are filed.<sup>35</sup> Section 332 also provides that state and local governments may not deny wireless facilities siting applications "on the basis of the environmental effects of radio frequency emissions," a matter over which the Commission has exclusive jurisdiction.<sup>36</sup> Pursuant to Section 332(c)(7)(B)(v), a person adversely affected by a state or local government agency's "final action" or "failure to act" on a personal wireless service facilities siting application "within a reasonable period of time after the request is duly filed" may sue such an agency "in any court of competent jurisdiction."<sup>37</sup> The Supreme Court has made clear, however, that courts may order only injunctive relief, not monetary remedies, in such actions.<sup>38</sup>

Section 6409(a) establishes that state and local governments "may not deny, and shall approve," any "request for a modification of an existing wireless tower or base station that does not substantially change the [facility's] physical dimensions." It specifies that applications for authorization to collocate new transmission equipment or to remove or replace existing equipment qualify for such treatment. Section 6409(a) does not specify an enforcement mechanism.

The Commission's 2009 Declaratory Ruling and 2014 Infrastructure Order<sup>41</sup> resolved a number of controversies by adopting definitive interpretations of ambiguous provisions in Section 332(c)(7) and Section 6409(a) and interpreting how their substantive and procedural requirements should be applied. On judicial review of the 2009 Declaratory Ruling, the Fifth Circuit<sup>42</sup> and the Supreme Court confirmed

that the Commission has authority to render such binding statutory interpretations and that courts must accord them *Chevron* deference.<sup>43</sup>

#### C. Local Governments' Review of Siting Applications

Notwithstanding the federal statutes and Commission decisions described above, some industry participants assert that local permitting and zoning processing for both new tower and small cell builds continue to encounter frequent delays. According to some firms, it frequently takes two years or more from small cell site acquisition to completion. <sup>44</sup> Many municipalities reportedly review small cells the same way they review macrocells because they have either a telecommunications siting process designed for macrocells or no special process for telecommunications facilities. <sup>45</sup> As a result, applicants are frequently required to contend with a long and costly process. <sup>46</sup>

Wireless industry representatives report that some localities impose high initial fees and excessive recurring charges for the deployment of infrastructure on public rights of way.<sup>47</sup> According to Mobilitie, many localities request "multiple, exorbitant fees that unlawfully discriminate against wireless technology and impair new or improved service."<sup>48</sup> Mobilitie asserts that many local governments impose fees that "appear to be set to recover what localities believe the 'market' rate is for the use of their rights of way,"<sup>49</sup> rather than to recover "fair and reasonable compensation" for localities' expenses.<sup>50</sup> Mobilitie states that the impact of these fees is "compounded because they are recurring [and] must be paid to the locality every year, meaning that over time they can far exceed all other deployment costs."<sup>51</sup> Mobilitie also

submits that many localities require providers to pay fees based on a percentage of their annual gross revenues, including fees as high as six to seven percent of revenues in some localities in Oregon and Washington and five percent in certain jurisdictions in California, Massachusetts, New York and other parts of Oregon.<sup>52</sup> In addition, we have heard anecdotally that some local governments allow only a single company to attach facilities to a particular pole or structure, and that some require unreasonable minimum distance limitations between wireless facilities in rights-of-way.

On the other hand, some local governments have guidelines designed to facilitate small cell deployments by clearly specifying approval timelines for such applications and identifying preferred site locations. In particular, a number of local governments have amended their zoning and telecommunications ordinances to expedite their decisions on small cell siting requests, and in some cases have created a separate, less burdensome administrative process for requests to add small cells to existing structures like poles or water towers. Cities also have developed master agreements for access to public rights of way in order to expedite attachment of small wireless facilities to city-owned infrastructure.<sup>53</sup> For instance, New York City has established Mobile Telecommunications Franchise Agreements that allow companies to "install and operate telecom equipment on street light poles, traffic light poles, and utility poles to facilitate wireless communications in the five boroughs."<sup>54</sup> These agreements feature a relatively low fee structure and streamlined processes for review of small wireless facility siting applications. In Baltimore, the City Council approved similar franchise agreements to enable companies to build DAS in public rights of way.<sup>55</sup> Boston also has entered numerous non-exclusive agreements with providers for small cell installation across city-controlled rights of way.<sup>56</sup>

#### II. DISCUSSION

## A. Determining How Local Land-Use Regulations or Actions Affect Wireless Infrastructure Deployment

The Commission relied on a substantial body of factual evidence as the basis for taking action in the 2009 Declaratory Ruling and the 2014 Infrastructure Order.<sup>57</sup> We invite commenters to submit

updated information that would help us evaluate whether further Commission action is warranted.<sup>58</sup> Do the concerns that motivated the Commission to take action in 2009 and 2014 still exist? Have they become less or more salient? Which, if any, local government actions (or inaction) have the effect of hindering the introduction of new services, obstructing efforts to improve existing services or make networks more robust, or deterring prospective service providers from entering markets? Commenters should provide specific information and detailed explanations and, to the extent possible, should quantify any such effects. We will accord greater weight to systematic data than merely anecdotal evidence.

At present, how much time typically elapses between the filing of complete facility siting applications and the approval or denial of such applications by local land-use authorities? We seek information from providers and local governmental authorities on the process for reviewing and making decisions on siting applications for small wireless facilities (including DAS and small cells), particularly the amount of time it takes to complete this process. In this regard, we request that commenters explain the extent to which siting review procedures for small wireless facilities are the same as those in place for macrocells. How long does it typically take local governments to process macrocell siting applications and how does this compare to the review of small wireless facilities or DAS applications? Are there greater coverage gaps in specific states or localities where applications are processed more slowly or where more stringent showings are required? If so, to what extent are these gaps attributable to such factors regarding the processing and consideration of siting applications?

We also seek comment on how often local land-use authorities approve or deny siting applications. How often are applications denied on the basis of (i) their inadequacy or incompleteness; (ii) engineering defects or other technical problems; (iii) environmental impacts; (iv) aesthetic concerns; (v) perceptions of excessive or overly dense deployment of wireless network facilities in particular areas; or (vi) other reasons? Are some parties' applications granted more frequently or reviewed more expeditiously than others, and if so, why? We seek comment on the extent to which litigation ensues as a result of delay or denial of siting applications. Do litigants invoke Sections 253 or 332 of the Communications Act, Section 6409(a) of the Spectrum Act, or other sources of law in support of their positions? How long does it take for such lawsuits to be resolved? How often are cases settled and how often do they proceed to final judgment?

We refer to a small sample of legislation, ordinances, and regulations proposed or adopted by state and local governments in Section I.C above. We invite parties to submit other examples and explain which of these have been most successful in reducing or restraining administrative burdens, costs and delay, whether such approaches could be employed more generally, and whether they should serve as models for other states or localities to follow. Commenters also should identify legislation, ordinances and regulations that impose legal requirements that parties view as problematic. To what extent do they unduly restrict (i) locations where facilities may be deployed; (ii) the technical configurations of network facilities; or (iii) access to rights-of-way owned or controlled by state and local governments? Do they

promote or thwart deployment of small cell or DAS facilities or other types of network infrastructure? To the extent they tend to thwart such deployment, is there any legitimate justification for maintaining these requirements in their current form? As discussed in greater detail in Section II.B.3 below, we also seek comment on the types of fees that local governments currently impose on providers for building facilities in rights of way, including both up-front fees for processing applications and recurring usage charges.

#### B. Potential Issues to Address in Declaratory Ruling

We seek comment on whether the Commission should take additional steps, by interpreting relevant statutory provisions, to help promote deployment of needed wireless infrastructure while protecting localities' legitimate interests. In the 2014 Infrastructure Order, the Commission clarified certain issues related to the interpretation of Section 332(c)(7) that it had not addressed in the 2009 Declaratory Ruling, but declined to revisit any aspect of that earlier ruling. We now solicit comments on whether the Commission should issue a declaratory ruling to further clarify any issues addressed in its 2009 and 2014 rulings or to fine-tune or modify any of its past statutory interpretations in light of current circumstances.

## 1. Local Governments' Practices that "Prohibit or Have the Effect of Prohibiting" Provision of Service

As discussed above, Sections 253(a) and 332(c)(7) establish that "[n]o State or local statute or regulation, or other State or local legal requirement, may prohibit or have the effect of prohibiting the ability of any entity" to provide personal wireless services or other telecommunications services.<sup>59</sup> The Commission has held that those statutory provisions "proscribe[] State and local legal requirements that prohibit all but one entity from providing telecommunications services in a particular State or locality," and that state or local government decisions to deny a siting application on the basis that one or more carriers other than the applicant already provides wireless service in the geographic area should be construed to "prohibit or have the effect of prohibiting" the provision of service.<sup>60</sup> More generally, the Commission has framed the question of whether a locality's actions have the effect of prohibiting the provision of service in terms of whether the action "materially inhibits or limits the ability of any competitor or potential competitor to compete in a fair and balanced legal and regulatory environment."<sup>61</sup>

Aside from that basic interpretation, however, the Commission has not addressed in detail the meaning of the statutory phrase "prohibit or have the effect of prohibiting" or the demonstration needed to establish that a state or local government's actions have prohibited or had the effect of prohibiting the provision of service for purposes of either Section 253 or 332. Numerous courts have construed the section, however. Courts generally agree that a carrier may establish that a land-use authority's denial of its siting application "prohibits or has the effect of prohibiting" the provision of service by showing that it has a significant gap in service coverage in the area and a lack of feasible alternative locations for siting facilities, but they disagree about the showings needed to satisfy this standard. The First, Fourth, and Seventh Circuits have imposed a "heavy burden" of proof to establish a lack of alternative feasible sites, requiring the applicant to show "not just that *this* application has been rejected but that further reasonable

efforts to find another solution are so likely to be fruitless that it is a waste of time even to try."62 By contrast, the Second, Third, and Ninth Circuits have held that an applicant must show only that its proposed facilities are the "least intrusive means" for filling a coverage gap in light of the aesthetic or other values that the local authority seeks to serve. 63 The Ninth Circuit has ruled that once an applicant makes a prima facie showing that its proposal is least intrusive, the burden shifts to the locality to rebut that showing by demonstrating a "potentially available and technically feasible alternative." 64

Should the Commission, as the expert agency, attempt to reconcile or otherwise resolve these or other differences of interpretation among the courts, and if so, how? For instance, does an action that prevents a technology upgrade "have the effect of prohibiting" the provision of service? Should the Commission address other disputed issues regarding the meaning of the phrase "prohibits or has the effect of prohibiting"?

#### 2. Reasonable Period of Time for Review of Siting Applications

In the 2009 Declaratory Ruling, the Commission found that a "reasonable period of time" under Section 332(c)(7)(B)(ii) is presumptively 90 days for state or local governments to process collocation applications and presumptively 150 days to process all other applications.<sup>65</sup> If a state or local government does not act upon an application within the relevant timeframe, then a "failure to act" has occurred and the provider may seek relief in a court of competent jurisdiction under Section 332(c)(7)(B)(v). In the 2014 Infrastructure Order, the Commission further clarified that these presumptively reasonable timeframes (or "shot clocks") apply regardless of state or local governments' purported moratoria on processing siting applications, and that the same shot clocks apply to DAS and small-cell applications. <sup>66</sup>

The presumptive timeframes established in the 2009 Declaratory Ruling may be longer than necessary and reasonable to review a small cell siting request. On the other hand, if small cell siting applications are filed dozens at a time, those presumptive timeframes may not be long enough. We therefore seek comment on whether different presumptive timeframes are "reasonable" in the small cell context. We also seek comment on whether the timeframes should vary depending on whether a state or local government receives siting requests proposing one small cell deployment at a time or consolidated

applications that request authority for a single provider to deploy multiple small cells (*i.e.*, a "batch" of small cell siting proposals).

We seek comment on whether the presumptive deadlines adopted in the 2009 Declaratory Ruling reflect an approach more appropriate for traditional macrocells than for the types of cells discussed here, which are much smaller and can be placed on light poles, utility poles, buildings, and other structures either on private property or in the public rights of way. Due to their size and placement, small cells may have less potential for aesthetic and other impacts than macrocells. We therefore seek comment on whether our interpretation of a "reasonable period of time" under Section 332(c)(7)(B)(ii) should be shorter for state and local governmental review of small cell facility applications. We also seek comment on how the Commission could define "small cell" for this purpose.

In addition, there may be efficiencies associated with a review process in which state and local governments would consider deployment of multiple small cells in a single consolidated application (*i.e.*, a batch of small deployment proposals from a single entity), particularly in light of their uniformity in size and appearance in many cases. A batched set of siting applications may be quicker to review than the same number of siting proposals submitted separately, but at the same time, we recognize it may take longer to review an application consisting of large numbers of cell siting proposals submitted at one time than to review small batches or single site applications. Therefore, we seek comment on whether the presumptively reasonable timeframe should be longer when many facilities requests are submitted at once. Could we interpret the Act so as to encourage the practice of processing a "batch" of siting requests by finding longer timeframes to be reasonable if the local government accommodates batched submissions, while holding to the existing, shorter timeframe if it only accepts individual applications? For example, should the Commission consider presumptions of 120 days for processing batches of collocation applications and 180 days for processing batches of applications for deployments other than collocations? If so, what should be the minimum number of sites to qualify as a "batch" for this purpose? Should there be multiple tiers depending on how many poles or antennas are involved?<sup>67</sup>

We seek information from providers and local governmental authorities on the process for reviewing and making decisions on siting applications for small wireless facilities (including DAS and small cells), particularly the amount of time it takes for the completion of this process. In this regard, we request that commenters explain the extent to which siting review procedures for small cells are the same as have been in place for macrocells. How long does it typically take local governments to process macrocell siting applications and how does this compare to the review of small cells? We also request that commenters provide information on the extent to which "batching" is currently used by the industry and local governments for the review of small cell deployments and to explain how well that process has been working to expedite the process and provide local governments with the information they need to make decisions on siting applications.

#### 3. Application Processing Fees and Charges for Use of Rights-of-Way

Section 253(c) provides that "[n]othing in this section affects the authority of a State or local government to manage the public rights-of-way or to require fair and reasonable compensation from telecommunications providers, on a competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory basis, for use of public rights-of-way on a nondiscriminatory basis, if the compensation required is publicly disclosed by such

government."<sup>68</sup> The Commission did not address the meaning of this provision in its 2009 or 2014 rulings. We now seek comment on whether the public interest would be served by issuing clarifications of any of the terminology in Section 253(c), as Mobilitie requests in its Petition.

According to Mobilitie, the phenomenon of excessive and unfair fees for use of rights of way "is not confined to a few outlier localities – it exists nationwide. Across the country, Mobilitie is being confronted with multiple fees, often being asked to pay not only up-front fees but also annual recurring fees which escalate by mandatory amounts year after year." We invite comments on whether these assertions are well-founded. How do local governments determine the up-front fees for applications and permits or the recurring fees for usage of rights of way? Do they set up-front fees based on the costs they incur in reviewing such applications or related administrative tasks such as monitoring the provider's construction of facilities, ensuring compliance with local building codes and excavation regulations, and verifying liability insurance? Are recurring charges set based on localities' ongoing costs of managing use of rights of way? To what extent are localities imposing charges based on other considerations, such as percentages of gross revenues or other indicia of the value of the use of the right-of-way?

The Circuit Courts of Appeals are split on whether the fees local governments charge to a telecommunications provider to use public rights of way must be directly related to the provider's use of the right of way and the costs that use imposes on the local government. In *Puerto Rico Tel. Co., Inc. v. Municipality of Guayanilla*, the First Circuit held that the fees local governments collect from telecommunications providers must at the very least be *related* to the actual use of rights of way and that "the costs [of maintaining those rights of way] are an essential part of the equation." Similarly, in *City of Auburn v. Qwest Corp.*, the Ninth Circuit found that certain city ordinances could have the "effect of prohibiting the provision of telecommunications services" where, *inter alia*, they imposed "fees... [that were] not based on the costs of maintaining the right of way, as required under the Telecom Act.<sup>72</sup>

Other circuits have sustained municipal ordinances that considered factors in addition to costs in setting fees for use of rights-of-way. In *TCG Detroit v. City of Dearborn*, the Sixth Circuit determined that a 4% gross revenue fee was fair and reasonable based on the amount of the use contemplated, the amount other providers would be willing to pay, and the impact on the profitability of the business. But we note that in *TCG New York, Inc. v. City of White Plains*, the Second Circuit held that the city could not require the provider to pay a franchise fee equal to five percent of its gross revenue because that fee did not apply to the incumbent provider, and Section 253(c) "forbids fees that are not competitively neutral, period, without regard to the municipality's intent."

We solicit comment on whether and how the Commission should interpret Section 253(c) for the purpose of ensuring that fees imposed on providers for using rights of way do not exceed fair and reasonable compensation. Should the Commission, as the expert agency, issue a declaratory ruling addressing the issues referred to above or to address other issues that the courts have not resolved to date? In particular, we seek comment on the proposals raised in Mobilitie's Petition. Mobilitie requests that the

Commission interpret the phrase "fair and reasonable compensation" in Section 253(c) to mean that local governments may receive compensation to recover their costs to review and issue permits, as well as to manage their rights of way, but that any additional charges are unlawful. How should the statutory term "fair and reasonable compensation" be defined? What are the appropriate criteria for state and local governments to apply in establishing fair and reasonable compensation? Must up-front fees or recurring compensation for use of local governments' rights of way be based on cost? If so, what measures of costs would be appropriate? Do the rules governing the computation of cost-based rates for pole attachments and access to private utilities' rights of way provide useful analogs for the "reasonable compensation" that state or local governments may assess? Why or why not? What types of expenses may local authorities recover through up-front and recurring charges, respectively? We seek comment on Mobilitie's proposal that recurring charges be limited to "incremental personnel and other costs for monitoring the facilities (for example, to ensure they are maintained in compliance with signage and other requirements)."

Mobilitie also argues that the Commission should deem fees to be "competitively neutral and non-discriminatory" within the meaning of Section 253(c) only if they "do not exceed those imposed on other providers for similar access." We also seek comment on Mobilitie's request that the Commission interpret Section 253(c)'s "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory" provision as requiring that fees imposed on a provider for access to rights of way may not exceed the charges that were imposed on other providers for similar access to the rights of way. Is this an appropriate or the best definition for the statutory phrase "competitively neutral and non-discriminatory"? If not, we seek comment on alternative definitions. What factors could properly be taken into account if the Commission were to interpret the statutory nondiscrimination requirement, as Mobilitie proposes, based on "a comparison of the relevant charges and the reasons for them," so that fees paid by different providers could vary only if "they cover dissimilar deployments, or where one deployment imposes materially greater burdens on a right of way than another." We seek comment on the extent to which discriminatory charges imposed by local governments on providers are a widespread occurrence that needs to be addressed.

Finally, we seek comment on Mobilitie's request that the Commission address the provision in Section 253(c) that compensation for the use of rights of way be "publicly disclosed by such government." Should the Commission adopt Mobilitie's proposal to "declare that localities must at least disclose to a carrier upon request the charges they have imposed on all carriers for access to rights of way," including "not only the amount of the charges" but also "how they [were] calculated"? We seek comment on the extent to which this information is unavailable from local governments and whether lack of information is a widespread problem.

#### III. PROCEDURAL MATTERS

This proceeding has been designated as a "permit-but-disclose" proceeding in accordance with the Commission's *ex parte* rules. Persons making *ex parte* presentations must file a copy of any written presentation or a memorandum summarizing any oral presentation within two business days after the presentation (unless a different deadline applicable to the Sunshine period applies). Persons making oral

Dear FCC Representative,

This letter is to provide comment on behalf of the City of Edina regarding Mobilitie's recent FCC Petition for Declaratory Ruling. Presently, the City of Edina has a set procedure for permitting telecommunication companies to use public right of way (ROW).

Upon hearing throughout the industry that small cell sites were arriving, the City of Edina amended its ordinance to attempt to address the concerns and unique impacts such sites represent to a community. We researched industry expectations and looked to similar communities where sites are deployed for guidance in understanding the issues. We have diverse opinions and divergent views within our constituency. We studied and addressed the topic based on a few common ideas that we all share. We generally supported the roll out of small cell sites because it would aide and enhance our 911 locating and tracking abilities. With the prolific rise of 911 calls emanating from cellular devices, it will allow us to be better emergency responders and allow for better connectivity. There continues to be the need to be good stewards of our (ROW) to provide governing guidelines and acceptable means to implement that arrival. We also understand the need for consistency among utilities and timely response for approvals. Upon the submission of a complete application and approval of a master license agreement, we feel that 60 days is a reasonable time for approval. In order to achieve this timeline it is absolutely critical to allow local units of government to hire consultants to manage the permit process and that cost is directly attributable to the applicant. We are not staffed to handle this number of applications.

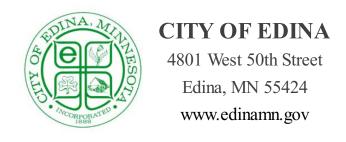
As mentioned above, the City of Edina set up a Master License Agreement with a telecommunications company enabling them to construct their system in the public ROW. We defer to Hennepin County and the State of Minnesota ROW governance when the site falls under those jurisdictions. The Master License Agreement addresses the general guidelines that need to be followed to place a tele-communication facility in the ROW. We require that the facility fits into the character of the neighborhood whether it is commercial or residential. We seek to guarantee that the site will not pose communications based interferences with our emergency response and other carriers. We seek to provide safe, mechanically sound and aesthetically pleasing sites for our community. We ensure to the public that the overall heights of poles within our ROW be consistent for their needs, while not being so aesthetically obtrusive for our constituents. We charge a nominal annual fee that covers maintenance of the light pole and costs associated with managing the ROW. These ROWs were dedicated to the public and would not be appealing to the telecommunications facilities if they didn't have transportation, electric and other amenities that make their installation and future maintenance feasible.

We currently are processing 6 sites within our community from other telecommunication providers. We have declined Mobilitie's request for access to our ROW because their applications were incomplete. We would be happy to entertain their application as long as they can prove that they are a telecommunications company or a Contractor performing work for a telecommunications company and are willing to sign a Master License Agreement that identifies the design standards that are defined within our community. Every community has to answer to its constituents so we ask that each community and local authority be given the right to control and govern its ROW.

Our roof top heating unit at 50th and France has a cracked heat exchanger resulting in less than desirable temperatures inside the store. The current unit has surpassed its original life expectancy and replacing the heat exchanger will not guarantee future performance. Staff recommends that we replace the unit entirely which will also allow us to comply with all current energy codes. The expected life of the new unit would be 12 years and will align with the life expectancy of the other two Edina Liquor locations.

Bredesen Park is 50 acres bigger than Wood Lake Nature Center and could be a similarly great place for walking, skiing and nature watching if it were properly maintained.

Also, it's long past time for the those turnstiles in Bredesen to be ripped out and replaced with entrances that allow easy access for the mobility impaired and those with jogging strollers, skis, etc. Nearby nature centers like Wood Lake and Westwood Hills maintain dog-free parks with simple spring-loaded gates or even no gates at all- why cant we?

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I too would like to see maintenance of the neighborhood parks become a priority before new amenities are added. There are more weeds than grass in many of the neighborhood parks and the hard surfaces on basketball and tennis courts are cracked and deteriorating. Edina's park system is one of it's great assets. Seeing them fall into disrepair is disappointing.

First and Foremost, the infrastructure maintenance should be top priority. No need to create space for a tennis court or a basketball court if you cant afford \$5 basketball nets, or \$100 backboards when they break down. The updates to the basketball and tennis courts at 50th and Wooddale are tremendous. I hope your future plan focuses on other deteriorated courts and park needs that would be used more if they were updated. On a different note, I have to admit, moving from Jackson Hole Wy, where the National Parks are your backdoor, the parks in Edina have been a tremendous experience for my kids. I know its not easy to maintain. With regards to additions, they recently added a 3 bouldering structures in Jackson and the response has been over the top positive. It has been a great outlet for kids, as well as adults who use it for pleasure and fitness. They occasionally hold small competitions. Possibly Edina Bouldering Clubs could be started for kids and or adults.

Please stop building new amenities...our parks have become sports facilities and much of the 'new' infrastructure is already falling into disrepair. Can we not just simply have natural space? Our park is Pamela which has gone from a wonderful mix of forest and fields to a sports complex with paved trails (more asphalt --awesome!) and beyond the ridiculous in fenced baseball fields. 90% of the players have never seen the outfield fences because no one can hit it that far. The paved trails were also very poorly done. The grading is such that even a modest rain floods the paved trails in two locations (middle of park and near the warming house) with no real way to get around it. The paved trail is also at the bottom of the sledding hill - the hill we have used for 20 years now has asphalt at the bottom. The thought that i am paying taxed for this stuff is painful. Repair what we have and stop the building!

I was part of the group that planned the Yorktown Community Garden. I pushed hard for parking, as there was no public parking and the city built some in cooperation with the Southdale Y - a mutually beneficial collaboration. The first couple years were rough, but the city wanted it to work and it is now really first rate. However, the larger park itself a few issues. No signs at all identifying the park or the garden. When in the garden many times I have told the people about the park, as it isn't obvious what it is. People could easily think it is a Y garden, given its location. If people don't know it is a park, they don't use it. Also all parks should have 1. Signage, 2. Seating and 3. Bathrooms and Drinking Fountains. And I don't think it is too much to ask that they all have some landscaping with trees and other plantings. They are to be places of beauty. And more than anything, the most visible success indicator of parks is that they are full of people having fun - not just teams playing part of the day, but all of the day. The best parks are ones that people use and enjoy. 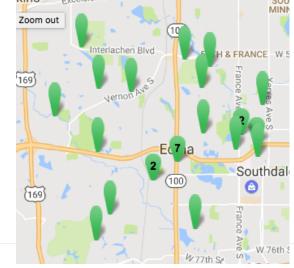

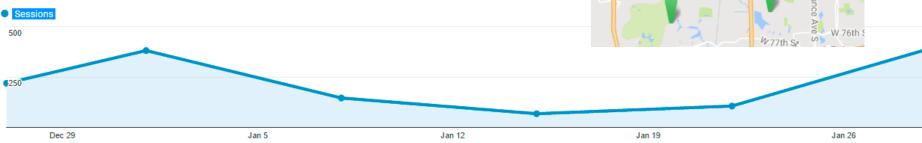

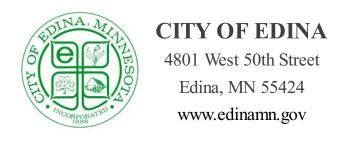

### Information / Background:

The CDBG Community Development Block Grant Program is a federal entitlement program administered by HUD who in turn, charges Hennepin County to oversee the distribution of funds to its communities. These funds are to be directed toward the improvement of housing opportunities and providing a suitable living environment for persons with low and moderate incomes. As a recipient of HUD funds, the County, and each community must affirmatively further fair housing. Hennepin County encourages all communities to be proactive by addressing impediments to fair housing choices.

The use of CDBG funds to address local needs must be consistent with priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan for affordable housing, community development and human services. HUD mandates that no more than 15% of the city's budget may be directed toward funding public service agencies with the remaining 85% addressing community development needs. Edina's preliminary 2017 budget allotment for planning purposes is \$118,424, a 2.5% increase from the final 2016 budget of \$115,571due to an identified increase in poverty in the city. Once HUD establishes the 2017 CDBG budget later this spring, Hennepin County and its respective cities will be notified of any changes to the allotments. If a change in the budget occurs, a paragraph in the accompanying Resolution provides for Edina's final 2017 CDBG budget to be readjusted without coming back to the City Council.

The following agencies requesting 2017 CDBG funds are those which the City has supported for many years:

### Public Services – 15% of total (\$118,424) budget = \$17,764

• Senior Community Services (HOME – Household & Outside Maintenance for Elderly)

The mission of HOME is to assist adults 60 years of age and older to maintain their dignity and live independently by providing accessible, reliable, and affordable homemaker, home maintenance and chore services. In 2016, 60 seniors received services; 70% of which were low

to moderate income individuals (CDBG requires at least 51%). Historically, the total HOME operating budget for Edina has been \$26,000, and since 2000 the City Council has asked the Edina Housing Foundation to make up the difference between the availability of CDBG funds to ensure that services to Edina seniors are met. SCS is requesting \$8,887, and will again submit a funding request to the Edina Housing Foundation to make up the \$17,113 difference needed to support the valuable H.O.M.E. services for Edina seniors.

### • Community Action Partnership for Suburban Hennepin (CAPSH)

CAPSH provides full-cycle homeownership services to include foreclosure prevention, first time homebuyer education, reverse mortgage counseling, home repair and maintenance, energy assistance, free legal services and tax preparation, employment counseling and financial/budget counseling. In 2016, CAPSH reported their programs benefited 23 households: 12 took advantage of the Reverse Mortgage Counseling; 4 Foreclosure Prevention; 2 Homebuyer workshop; and 1 household took advantage of the Home Rehab & Maintenance Counseling, Financial Literacy Workshop, and FAIM Enrollment programs. CAPSH reported that in 2016, 90% of their client's incomes were below 80% AMI, (CDBG requires a minimum 51% to be low or moderate income individuals.) CAPSH is requesting \$4,700 to continue serving Edina residents in 2017.

#### HOME Line

HOME Line provides tenant advocacy services for low income Edina renters with a Tenant Hotline offering tools necessary to keep their homes safe and affordable. In 2016 they served 105 Edina families and prevented approximately 6 evictions, saving the homeowners approximately \$13,820. Over the past year, HOME Line's Somali and Spanish speaking tenant advocates continued to work with the immigrant communities in their native languages. HOME Line is requesting \$4,328; however \$4,177 is proposed to ensure that the public service allotment does not exceed 15% of the overall budget. In the event the final 2017 CDBG budget is increased, HOME Line's allotment may be increased as well.

The following is a breakdown of the Public Services final 2016 CDBG budget, the 2017 requests from the service providers, and the recommended 2017 CDBG budget:

### Community Development – 85 % of total (\$118,424) budget = \$100,660

After the \$18,424 distribution for public services, **\$100,660** remains to be directed toward community development projects addressing the housing needs of low and moderate income individuals in the community. In years past, the Community Development funds have been

### distributed between the **Rehabilitation of Private Property** program **and West Hennepin Affordable Housing Land Trust (WHAHLT).**

The Rehabilitation of Private Property program provides deferred repayment loans of up to \$30,000 to make structural improvements to owner occupied homes with no more than 4 dwelling units per property. Eligibility for the program is based on a household income schedule established by HUD for the Minneapolis/St. Paul area. The income limits may not exceed 120% of the Area Median Income (AMI), which for a 4 person household is currently \$99,500. Hennepin County facilitates this program and reports that currently, there is over \$177,000 available in Edina's program with no waiting list. The large reserve of funds is a result of former loans being paid off and recycled back into the program to again assist Edina homeowners maintain their homes. In an effort to raise awareness of the housing rehab program, the Communication's Department has advertised the program in the city's publications, and will continue to do so. However, due to the large reserve of funds currently available for the Rehabilitation of Private Properties program it is recommended that the program not receive funding in the 2017 budget cycle.

It is recommended that all of the **\$100,660** community development funds be distributed to **West Hennepin Affordable Housing Land Trust (WHAHLT)** for their Homes Within Reach program which provides an affordable homeownership opportunity using the Community Land Trust model for income eligible homebuyers.

The Community Land Trust model removes the market value of the land from the mortgage equation, thus reducing the cost of a home for a work-force family by approximately 30-50 percent - This assistance makes the house more affordable than those on the open real estate market. WHAHLT owns the land and the homeowner owns the home. A Ground Lease signed by both parties defines and secures the roles and responsibilities of both WHAHLT and the homeowner, including, but not limited to a resale/recapture provision, and long-term rights and use of the land.

One of the strategies identified in the Housing element of Edina's Comprehensive Plan calls for the City's commitment to fund and expand its financial and technical support of community land trusts. Attesting to that goal, since 2007, the City has provided approximately \$923,945 in CDBG assistance to WHAHLT - aiding in the purchase, rehabilitation and resale of 11 Edina homes to income eligible buyers. Currently, the 2016 final CDBG allotment of \$98,235 remains to be spent.

Moving forward, the proposed \$100,660 when added to the \$98,235, 2016 funds, will provide \$198,895 toward assisting WHAHLT to purchase at least two additional land trust homes; reinforcing the City's commitment to providing and securing affordable housing in the community.

Over the past year, the city has advertised the aforementioned programs as well as other social services available to Edina residents through the City of Edina's website, the "About Town" magazine, and activities directories; and will continue to do so in the year to come.

Hello,

As we approach the new year, the time has come to start allocating funds to projects for the 2017 program year, which will run July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018. Attached to this email are the funding request forms for this year, as well as various resources for the allocation process. The deadline to submit funding request materials will be **4:00pm on Friday**, **February 24, 2017**. Please be sure to schedule your required public meeting in order to meet that timeline.

As usual, we do not yet know the actual CDBG entitlement allocation that Hennepin County will receive from HUD. However, should Congressional appropriations to the CDBG program remain unchanged from 2016, we anticipate that the county's allocation will be slightly lower in 2017 due to reductions in poverty and overcrowded housing in the county according to the most recent ACS 5-year data. Additionally, each Direct Allocation City within the county may have changes to its allocation amount based on changes in the three CDBG "formula criteria" (population, poverty, and overcrowded housing) within that city.

Below are our current estimates for Direct City Allocations for 2017 based on the most recent ACS 5-year data:

The neighbors and the seniors themselves appreciate the help we provide to maintain seniors' homes with fresh paint, to help keep the home free of clutter and debris, and to keep lawns mowed and driveways and walkways clear of snow. Funding will help keep services affordable for 60 low-income seniors.

### **Activity Need, Consistency with Plans, and Public Support**

### Who is the target clientele?

Edina seniors age 60+

### What needs does this activity address?

Most seniors wish to remain independent and studies have shown that the cost of independence is substantially lower than the cost of nursing homes. According to Hennepin County's GAPS Analysis, homebased services - including homemaking, home maintenance, and chore services - are deemed the most critical needs in order for frail elders to remain out of nursing homes. The goal of the HOME Program is to assist seniors to remain in their homes, providing them with affordable services they can no longer do for themselves and preventing unnecessary nursing home placement.

Providing services to the senior population supports developing a healthy and livable community for all ages. The HOME Program is a resource that supports the diverse senior population of New Hope. The Program connects seniors to the community through volunteer groups to help deliver services to the senior residents of New Hope. An added benefit of partnering with the HOME program is that we help to keep up the housing stock in Edina.

#### Is the need for this activity growing?

Yes. According to the MN State Demographer, by the year 2020, there will be more people over the age of 65 than school age children. Suburban Hennepin County has more people over the age of 60 than Dakota and Ramsey Counties combined (2010 Census Data). A host of studies show that seniors prefer to stay in their own homes and in their local neighborhoods.

### How does the program address these needs?

Participation in the HOME program assures access to additional resources and services that benefit the older adult. Additional services are provided in a seamless manner, consistent with our mission, as part of our comprehensive approach to helping older adults live independently in their own homes. Many frail elders utilize other Senior Community Services' services, such as care coordination or support for their family members through caregiver coaching and counseling. In addition, Senior Community Services has successfully established partnerships with over 300 other agencies, units of government, churches, school districts and local community programs to provide access to services such as respite, adult day services and home care, meals on wheels and transportation. This ensures that Senior Community Services provides an integrated, non-duplicative service system for every elder, regardless of that person's entry point into Senior Community Services.

#### **Description of Activity:**

As community needs change, CAPSH adapts its programs to meet those needs. CAPSH has broadened the scope of its housing programs to individual asset building and maintenance, focusing on providing counseling, education and savings programs that will increase the financial stability of low- and moderate-income households.

Services in the Individual Asset Building and Maintenance program include:

Counseling: Foreclosure Prevention; Reverse Mortgage, Home Rehab and Maintenance; First-Time

Homebuyer; Tax Preparation assistance

Education: First-Time Homebuyer; Financial Literacy

Savings/Assets: Family Assets for Independence in Minnesota (FAIM - provides 3:1 savings match towards assets, including buying a home, after 2 years); Energy-Related Intensive Education Program; Vehicle Repair Program.

**Process Improvement:** While many of these programs are not new, CAPSH has improved our process, implementation, and cultural capacity of our programs to create better and more responsive services for our clients. For instance, housing counselors are now (or will be) cross-trained and certified in the different housing assistance and financial education areas CAPSH offers so they are able to provide more comprehensive assistance, while Housing Advisors will also work with clients in the FAIM program to improve their financial stability.

With the addition of Spanish and Somali speaking Housing Advisors, CAPSH Homeownership programs are now available in multiple languages.

Recognizing the vital role of financial education plays in moving people in poverty towards self-sufficiency, CAPSH has integrated financial education workshops into its housing counseling programs.

**New programs:** In 2015 CAPSH reintroduced the FAIM Program. The FAIM program provides a 3:1 savings match after 2 years. The savings can be applied to purchasing a home, starting a business, or pursuing higher education. In addition to the savings match, the FAIM program provides group and individual counseling. Advisors work with participants to learn about budgeting, cleaning up credit, and overcoming obstacles blocking the way to purchasing a major asset, buying a home, education, or microbusiness, and developing a plan to achieve goals.

#### Activity Need, Consistency with Plans, and Public Support

#### Who is the target clientele?

Populations to be served include low to moderate-income (<80% AMI) households including families, children, elderly, special needs individuals and Limited English Proficiency households. The intended outcome of the services is that low-income individuals and families will have the knowledge, skills and resources to manage their finances, build or preserve financial assets and achieve safe, affordable and stable housing. CAPSH has recently hired two bi-lingual Homeownership Advisors which enables CAPSH to offer its programs in English, Somali and Spanish, providing the flexibility to respond to the changing demand for services in response to the improving economy and changing demographics of Hennepin County.

#### What needs does this activity address?

As the needs analysis for Hennepin County's Consolidated Plan (2015-19) shows, there is a great need for lowand moderate-income households to be able to obtain and maintain affordable housing. The home purchasing and maintenance services provided by CAPSH's Asset Building and Maintenance program addresses these needs by offering counseling services to:

- a) purchase a home that is affordable based on realistic budgeting and understanding the continuing home maintenance costs
- b) provide home rehab counseling and guidance to assure that older homes remain affordably habitable.

Similarly, financial literacy workshops, counseling and the FAIM program (Family Assets for Independence in Minnesota) are all geared to providing an understanding of realistic budgeting and purchasing within one's means. Services for low-income large households, seniors and people with limited English proficiency continue to remain very high priorities in suburban Hennepin County, as do services for homeowners facing a financial crisis (still primarily due to medical crises and job loss). Foreclosure Prevention and Reverse Mortgage counseling continues to be available for homeowners in crisis.

#### Is the need for this activity growing?

The Minnesota Homeownership Center (MNHOC) in its 2015 State of Homeownership report identified as a continuing need the development and maintenance of affordable, sustainable, and enduring housing. In order to achieve the goal of successful homeownership for low to moderate-income households in Minnesota, MNHOC identified two critical needs to be met: "(a) empower homeowners to make smart choices . . . .; and (b) make the benefits of homeownership real for everyone, no matter race, region or neighborhood." (State of Homownership report, p. 14). CAPSH's Asset Building and Maintenance programs meet these needs through financial and homeownership education and counseling. Opportunity and access gaps persist and continue to grow, particularly in communities of color and communities of recent immigrants. CAPSH programs also specifically target seniors; this demographic is growing and their needs are changing dramatically. The aging of the American-Minnesotan-suburban population is well-documented; as this demographic grows, and as the housing stock continues to age, there is, and will continue to be, a need to assist seniors in retaining affordable and habitable housing.

#### How does the program address these needs?

#### **Foreclosure Prevention:**

CAPSH Housing Advisors provide foreclosure prevention counseling to Edina residents in danger of losing their homes due to delinquency.

- Advisors work with clients from the initial stages of foreclosure through sheriff's sales and continue to provide counseling up to eviction following the redemption period.
- Significant time is devoted to reviewing clients' financial situations to evaluate if they are able to maintain their current housing long-term.
- Advisors work directly with clients and their lenders to renegotiate mortgage terms that allow clients to stay in their homes when feasible. Advisors work with lenders to negotiate mortgage modifications, refinancing, short sales and other means of resolving the homeowner's housing crisis.

#### **Homebuyer Education:**

CAPSH provides First-Time Homebuyer workshops using the Homestretch curriculum developed by the Minnesota Homeownership Center.

- Workshops are offered in multiple-session evening classes or single-session workshops to make them easily accessible.
- Participants review budget and financial considerations, learn what to look for when purchasing a home, and options for financing. Participants also learn about repair and maintenance issues to consider before and after a purchase.
- Participants hear from real estate agents and lenders about the homebuying process from their perspective, giving participants insight into what to expect.
- Homebuyer workshops total 8 hours. Upon completing the program clients receive certificates; many lenders require first-time homebuyers to receive a certifitication of completion prior to closing to ensure the buyer understand the lending process and their financial obligations.

#### Homebuyer Pre-purchase Counseling:

Once participants have completed the Homestretch workshop they are eligible to receive individual prepurchase counseling at CAPSH.

- Advisors examine a client's financial status in more detail, and work with clients to develop budgets and work on credit repair with the goal of positioning clients to obtain home purchase financing.
- Clients meet with the advisors in 45 minute -2 hour increments depending on needs and circumstances.

#### **Reverse Mortgage Counseling:**

CAPSH provides one-on-one, in-person counseling to eligible clients who are interested in a reverse mortgage. To be eligible, one spouse must be at least 62 years old and meet financial eligibility requirements

- Meet with seniors interested in the program to discuss the nature and requirements of a reverse mortgage, how to work with lenders, available options and consequences of taking out a reverse mortgage.
- CAPSH does not endorse taking a reverse mortgage, nor does it endorse particular lenders or products.

#### Home Repair and Maintenance:

The Home Rehab Advisor works with low-income clients in need of critical home repairs or maintenance needed to maintain habitability.

- Provides advice about types of repairs that are necessary, how to obtain suitable contractors, and how to obtain financial assistance, particularly through municipal programs.
- This is a much-needed service for low-income homeowners who may not be able to determine on their own the repair work needed, or how to pick out a legitimate contractor.

#### Financial Literacy Workshops:

Financial education is critical for households to move successfully from poverty to a level of self-sufficiency. As a result, the financial education workshops are now a key component of the Asset Building and Maintenance Programs.

#### **FAIM Program:**

The FAIM (Family Assets for Independence in Minnesota) was reintroduced at CAPSH in 2015 and provides a 3:1 match to participants' savings after 2 years. The FAIM program involves group and individual counseling; advisors work with participants to learn about budgeting, cleaning up credit, overcoming obstacles blocking the way to purchasing a major asset, and developing a plan to achieve goals. FAIM participants may use their savings to purchase a home, pay for education expenses, or start a business.

CAPSH's programs focus on low-income people's need for housing and financial stability through a range of services not otherwise readily available in the community. For instance, seniors are able to access services that protect them from a range of problems, everything from losing their home to losing their savings. CAPSH makes these services accessible by offering them at multiple locations and times, and makes them accessible to low-income clients by offering the majority of services and programs for free. The sole exception is Homebuyer Education programs--CAPSH is required by the State of Minnesota to charge a fee.

#### Describe any multi-community, multi-agency, or public/private partnerships and support:

CAPSH partners with over 260 community organizations, faith-based organizations and local, state and federal governments and agencies. Aside from providing CDBG-funded programs on behalf of cities like Edina, CAPSH provides information and referrals for housing matters (particularly first time homebuyer assistance programs and foreclosure prevention counseling) in conjunction with city offices. CAPSH works closely with many city offices to conduct and coordinate workshops and other events, including Financial Security Workshops.

CAPSH participates with local, state, and federal housing agencies and social services providers to conduct housing fairs and outreach activities. In addition to being active participants in partnership and collaborative efforts involving government housing agencies at various levels of government, CAPSH has a staff member on the board of MMFPA.

Describe the organization's experience providing this service:

CAPSH has offered housing counseling and education programs since 1992. CAPSH has moved from program-specific counselors to Housing Program Advisors, who are cross-trained AND cross-certified in housing counseling and education and financial counseling programs. CAPSH counselors are certified by Minnesota Homeownership Center (MNHOC), Minnesota Mortgage Foreclosure Prevention Association (MMFPA), the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and Lutheran Social Services (Financial Literacy Counseling). Cross-training provides the flexibility to respond to the changing demand for specific programs and service in response to the improving economy and offers the ability to provide more holistic approaches to financial and housing stabilization and security. CAPSH currently has 5 Homeownership and Asset Advisors and 2 Asset Building support staff; additional support is provided through Planning & Development (program development, reporting and evaluation). The Asset Building and Maintenance programs are supervised by the Director of Program Operations.

Before to joining the staff at CAPSH this year, Suzanne served as the Director of Minnesota FoodShare, the Director of Services for Partners in Community Supports, a program of Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota, the Director of Performance Management for the Family Assistance Unit (Food Stamps/SNAP, TANF, and Medicaid) of the Tennessee Department of Human Services, the Research Coordinator for the Brian A. Racial Disparities Study for the Tennessee Department of Children's Services, and served on the faculty of the University of Tennessee College of Social Work. Prior to moving into management positions, she worked in direct service positions with children, recent immigrants and refugees, and homeless women and children. #### **HOME Line's Tenant Hotline in Edina: 2016**

#### **OVERVIEW**

In 2016, 105 Edina renter households contacted HOME Line for Tenant Hotline Services. This represents service to approximately 263 residents when all family members have been counted. Based on this level of service the cost to serve Edina in 2017 is \$4,328.

#### HIGHLIGHTS

In 2016, HOME Line helped renters from Edina:

- Recover and/or save an estimated \$13,820
- Prevent an estimated 6 evictions.
- Renters with repair issues who follow our advice are 37% more likely to get their problem fixed than those who don't.

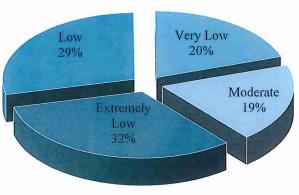

#### Activity Need, Consistency with Plans, and Public Support

#### Who is the target clientele?

Low Income Renters

Renters make up nearly 5,733 households in Edina, and many of these families have low incomes. When renters have problems involving their homes, those who don't know their rights and responsibilities can end up living in housing that is unsafe, lose security deposits that are rightfully theirs, or make decisions that cost them their home. HOME Line provides renters with the tools necessary to keep their homes safe and affordable. Additionally, the latest census information shows that Edina now has 1,038 Spanish speaking residents. Edina also has 760 African born immigrants. These immigrant communities are more likely to be renters, low-income, and because of language and cultural barriers, more susceptible to poor rental practices.

#### What needs does this activity address?

Education, Outreach and Services, - Tenant Advocacy

#### Is the need for this activity growing?

Yes, the level of service continues to trend upward from year to year.

#### How does the program address these needs?

HOME Line provides renters with the tools necessary to keep their homes safe and affordable. HOME Line's Tenant Hotline provides free legal advice to tenants about landlord/tenant law. These services prevent problems ranging from homelessness to illness from unsafe living conditions, and result in reducing the use of the city's emergency resources.

In 2016, our Tenant Hotline Services to Edina advised 105 renter households, helped prevent the eviction of 6 families, and saved tenants at least \$13,820. The most common reasons Edina residents call our hotline are: repairs, security deposits, and Break Lease Questions. The need for this service in Edina is apparent – Edina residents already rely on this valuable service.

While our services are available to all renters free of charge, 81% of our Edina callers have low incomes; over three-quarters (76%) of these callers are women; 22% are racial minorities. Our programs are aimed at low-income renters.

HOME Line's language and cultural access initiative means that Somali and Spanish speaking renters can directly call our Somali and Spanish speaking Tenant advocates in their native languages and get assistance with their rental problems.

#### Is this a priority need identified in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan?

Yes

#### Is this a need not currently or adequately being addressed by other programs/activities?

Yes, HOME Line is the only program that offers these services. The Attorney General's office refers tenants with questions to our hotline, but does not give tenants specific legal advice. We often confer with our colleagues at Legal Aid on litigation and court issues. However, our hotline is able to serve a large number of renter households with immediate phone advice and does not have the extremely low-income eligibility requirements of Legal Aid.

Not enforcing income restrictions allows us to serve the "working poor," which are made up of individuals who cannot afford traditional legal services but who are more seriously affected by wrongly withheld security deposits, the prospect of an eviction, and serious repair issues.

By providing language access to Somali and Spanish speaking renters, through our tenant hotline services, we provide our rental services in native languages, giving these immigrant communities the same immediate access that English speaking renters receive through our tenant hotline.

#### Describe any multi-community, multi-agency, or public/private partnerships and support:

HOME Line has a history of successfully partnering with foundations and local and state governments to help support our work. HOME Line strives to collaborate with other advocacy organizations, service providers and government entities to efficiently and effectively deliver our services to low-income tenants. We will utilize these partnerships as we conduct outreach with our new language and cultural staff.

On the hotline, we provide trainings to develop a local network of trained tenant/landlord advocates who can identify renters who need legal assistance and situations where organizing is appropriate to solve a building-wide problem.

The Tenant Hotline began in 1992 as a service to Suburban Hennepin County residents. Today we serve the entire state and have recently taken our 200,000th call. Five full time and one half-time staff attorneys, along with two full-time Spanish Speaking Tenant Advocates, and a half-time Somali Tenant Advocate work on the hotline along with 50-75 law student volunteers each year.

#### **Description of Activity:**

West Hennepin Affordable Housing Land Trust (WHAHLT) dba Homes Within Reach (HWR) is requesting a 2017 CDBG award from the City of Edina, to continue the implementation of the HWR program in the community of Edina; creating and preserving affordable homeownership for workforce families.

HWR was created in order to increase the number of homeownership opportunities that exist for working households in suburban Hennepin County. HWR mission creates a unique homeownership opportunity for workforce families, who provide essential services to Edina and suburbs of Hennepin County. Such as custodians, teachers, municipal workers, retail staff, office personnel, food prep staff, customer service representatives, and many more who are unable to purchase a home in the communities where they work and or live.

The major objective of creating affordable homeownership is to offer an opportunity for low to moderate income work-force households in becoming homeowners, which in turns adds value to the family unit, community and protects the investment of the subsidy made possible by multiple funders.

Homes Within Reach creates affordability by using the Community Land Trust practice, which removes the value of the land from the mortgage equation creating initial affordability. HWR acquires and retains the ownership of real property, rehabilitates the property and then sells the improvements (home) to qualified buyers earning less than 80% Area Median Income (AMI). The land trust practice offers long term affordability (99-year lease), where each affordable home will offer affordable homeownership to 7-12 families throughout the life of the lease. Thus funding is recycled with every resale.

The property costs less because HWR homebuyers purchase only the house (Improvements) and enter into a Ground Lease with WHAHLT to secure the long-term rights and use of the land.

Each housing project is funded by two sources of capital; proceeds of the sale of the home by a qualified buyer and grants and in-kind resources awarded to the organization to cover the costs of the land, renovations and project costs. Therefore, the proposed activity will have multiple matching funding sources to augment the requested CDBG award, which includes Hennepin County - AHIF, HOME Partnership, Metropolitan Council, & Minnesota Housing.

#### **Activity Need, Consistency with Plans, and Public Support**

#### Who is the target clientele? What populations will benefit from the activity?

HWR supports work-force families providing essential services to the community and surrounding suburbs who typically cannot afford to purchase an entry-level home in Edina, yet works, resides or has family who lives in the community.

HWR's target market is work-force households with incomes at 80% or less of area median income (AMI). HWR was created to increase the number of homeownership opportunities that exist for working households in suburban Hennepin County. Such as custodians, teachers, municipal workers, retail staff, office personnel, food prep staff, customer service representatives and many more who are unable to purchase a home in the communities where they work and or live.

HWR program features of cost, quality and location of its homes has been and continues to appeal and draw interest from work-force households with low to moderate income. Impact on owning a home for HWR buyers is that it provides a stabilized environment for families and specifically children. This includes but is not limited to having their own bedrooms and or living space in their home, a backyard to play in and or a neighborhood filled with kids to develop friendships, access to multiple recreational spaces that are safe and provide family time and a stable environment to raise children.

Furthermore, the HWR CLT program provides stable affordable housing costs (moving away from the ever-escalating rent); which enables the homeowner to invest in endeavors that truly enhance the quality of their lives, such as education for the family, career opportunities, supportive health environment and the comfort and security of being homeowners.

Please refer to the supplement Information Exhibit 2 that provides a profile of those HWR has served in Edina over the past ten years.

#### What needs does this activity address?

The major objective of creating affordable homeownership is to offer an opportunity for work-force households to become homeowners, which in turns adds value to the family unit while not over burdening their income to do so. Homeowners using the Community Land Trust practice receive benefits that typically are accrued to homeowners; tax benefits, ability to make improvements, increase their financial standings and offer legacy to their spouses and children and provide a strong base for families to flourish and engage community services, jobs and Educational opportunities.

Furthermore, families many times can manage their cost of living expenses better when moving away from escalating rents currently taking place in the rental market in Hennepin County.

In addition, it benefits the community through preserving and rehabilitating of existing housing stock and provides a mechanism to invest in long-term affordable homeownership that protects the investment of the subsidy made possible by multiple funders.

Therefore, the Community Land Trust practice impacts and addresses the following.

- Expands Homeownership Opportunities
- Retains Community Wealth
- Enhances Residential Stability
- Preserves Housing Affordability.

#### How does the activity meet a need identified in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan?

HWR program meets the Hennepin County Consolidated high priority for offering homeownership assistance by creating and preserving <u>long-term</u> affordable homeownership to workforce families (80% AMI or lower) in the suburbs of Hennepin County.

In addition, the program requires homeownership training by our applicants via the Homestretch Classes, which is another high priority of the Consolidated Plan and HWR works with homeowners when crisis arises and they need to participate in foreclosure prevention measures.

Furthermore, over the years, several of our families have members who are physically disabled have worked with HWR, Hennepin County and other non-profits to make the home accessible and barrier free for the disabled family member.

How does the activity meet other locally identified community development needs?

The proposed activity of creating and sustaining affordable homeownership in the City of Edina meets a community priority because of the challenges of providing affordable homeownership options and the need for additional suburban workforce housing since the price of entry-level properties are out of the reach for many essential workers who work and or live in Edina and the surrounding area.

Homes Within Reach is a program with fourteen years of experience providing scattered site affordable homeownership meeting multiple community needs; they include but are not limited to the following.

- 1. Workforce families provide essential services to maintain and sustain the infrastructure of the community.
- 2. Demand for living in the suburban communities has led to increased home values that have risen to the point that many single-family homes, despite their age, are not affordable to low and moderate income work-force families. Land values in particular have increased, making it difficult for developers to build affordable single-family homes.
- 3. The program preserves community resources through the use of existing buildings (preservation and rehabilitation of existing housing stock) and the community's infrastructure.
- 4. The program enables new comers to join the community, support the investment in the delivery of the Community's infrastructure and maximize the one-time investment in sustaining affordability.

The purpose of creating affordable homeownership offers an opportunity for low to moderate income families to become homeowners, which in turn adds value to the buyer and the City of Edina and protects the investment of the subsidy made possible by many funders.

#### Describe any community or private partnership support:

HWR has partnered with various suburban communities to support the HWR program and participates with local organizations to support the HWR efforts. HWR collaborates with organizations like Greater Metropolitan Housing Corporation, who administers a fix-up loan program for CLT homeowners for home improvements and a credit counselor to assist prospective applicants in repairing their credit in order to qualify for a mortgage. Providers who offer credit counseling to assist prospective applicants who need to repair their credit in order to qualify for a mortgage through CASPH and other accredited providers funded by Minnesota Housing. When homeowners are in a time of crisis, HWR works with homeowners and refers them to city/county/private resources to assist them with their challenges and needs.

Furthermore, HWR is working with Hennepin County and Sentence to Service program, to create additional CLT properties by purchasing tax forfeiture properties, rehabilitating the property by the STS program and selling the property to HWR, so in turn HWR can sell the home to a qualified buyer, using the CLT practice.

HWR collaborates with the Minneapolis Community Land Trust with data collection and networking activities and continues to be a member of the Minnesota CLT Coalition and the Grounded Solution Network, where the organization works with its peers on lobbying initiatives, development of best practices, resources and products the CLT's offer to current and future homeowners.

As outlined in **Exhibit 3**, the organization works with a team of consultants and specialized vendors that provide resources, expertise, services and collaboration to accomplish meeting the organization's mission of transforming lives through homeownership.

WHAHLT-HWR began it work as a non-profit organization in 2002, using the Community Land Trust practice in assisting low-to-moderate income workforce families to become homeowners, beginning

in the City of Minnetonka and then growing to service several other Hennepin County suburbs. During the past fourteen years, HWR has demonstrated its capabilities and capacity as a small organization to sustain and grow its target service area from one to twelve (12) communities, assisting 150 families, who would not have been able to purchase a home.

Not only has HWR grown in the number of communities it serves, but it also has grown with respect to the assortment of styles and types of entry-level homes it has offered to work-force families; beginning with existing detached single family homes in 2002, adding a newly constructed detached single family home in 2005 and townhomes and twin homes in 2004 through 2011.

The steady growth over the years is supported by the HWR staff and its team of consultants and specialized vendors, (contractors, realtors, attorney, appraiser, closer, auditor etc.) who deliver the resources, expertise and services to accomplish the operational responsibilities in creating and preserving affordable homeownership using the Community Land Trust practice.

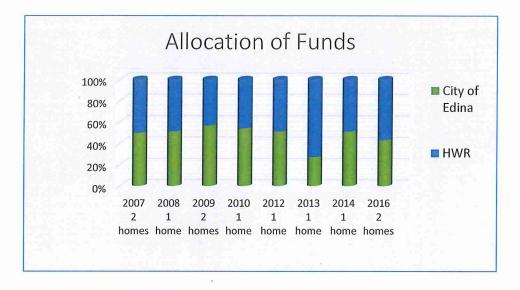

The target market is households with 50% - 80% Area Median Incomes (AMI). The average homeowners AMI for homes sold in Edina beginning in 2007 is 62.1%, with an average income of \$48,032.

#### **Key Points of the CLT Program**

HWR creates and preserves affordable homeownership for families that otherwise would be unable to buy a home in the western suburbs of Hennepin County.

Key points of the program are:

- HWR homes cost less than market rate homes because WHAHLT/HWR homebuyers purchase only the house (Improvements) and enter into a Ground Lease with WHAHLT to secure the long-term rights and use of the land. By taking the cost of the land out of the real estate transaction, land trust homes are more affordable than houses on the open real estate market. By eliminating these costs, homes are purchased at approximately 30% to 50% below the typical market value amount.
- The homeowner may sell his/her home only to a qualified buyer or to WHAHLT. The resale price is limited by a formula which more than likely (based on market conditions) allows the seller to recover the original cost of the house plus a modest profit. Therefore, assuming the house has retained or increased in value, the homeowner who sells his or her home will get all of their equity (the amount of money that they used as a down payment as well as all principal that has been paid). In addition, they will receive a percentage (35% for WHAHLT) of the home's appreciation (the amount that a home has increased in value since it was purchased).
- Community Land Trust homes remain affordable for consecutive generations of homeowners, because the resale restriction is the subsidy retention and is tied to the home not the owner ensuring the home continues to be affordable with each sale over the lease period, serving multiple families over the course of the 99-year lease and more. Thus,

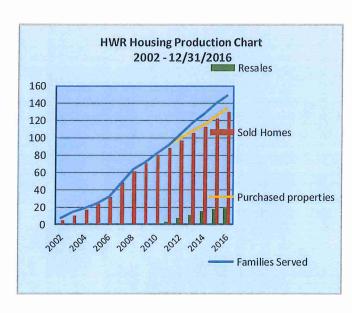
subsidies awarded to HWR, stay with the home and incorporate perpetual affordability using the community land trust practice.

- The homes will be part of the resale-restricted domain of WHAHLT and will remain affordable for low-moderate income households, through one resale after another, and to continue to serve homebuyers without the need of additional subsidies, regardless the number of times the home sells (99-198 years). The Ground lease (executed between WHAHLT and the homeowner) protects the assets of the land by providing the land trust certain rights to safeguard the condition and affordability of the home.
- A <u>CLT leaseholder-homeowner receives benefits</u> similar to non-CLT homeowners such as the ability to build equity, the federal mortgage interest and property tax deduction and the ability to pass on the lease interest and home to their heirs.
- The components of <u>permanent housing affordability</u> and <u>subsidy retention</u> create and sustain the affordability of the homes through the HWR program. Therefore, the removal of the market value of the land from the mortgage equation provides <u>initial affordability</u> and <u>permanent affordability</u> is otained through:
  - A pricing formula that provides the owner with an amount of equity while ensuring that the resale price of the home is affordable and
  - ☑ A resale restriction that requires the homeowner to sell the house to another qualified household.

HWR offers both communities and homebuyers the ability to sustain permanently affordable homeownership by maintaining affordability, which preserves public and private investment.

## West Hennepin Affordable Housing Land Trust Dba Homes Within Reach



As of December 31, 2016 Homes Within Reach (HWR) had acquired 134 properties since it began creating and preserving affordable homeownership in the spring of 2002 and has assisted 149 families (includes 19 resales) in purchasing a home.

Please refer to the Housing Chart to the left, which illustrates the steady growth of WHAHLT - HWR from 2002 through 12/31/2016.

Homes Within Reach staff and its team of consultants and specialized vendors (contractors, realtors, attorney, appraiser, closer, auditor etc.,) deliver the resources, expertise and services to accomplish the operational responsibilities in creating and preserving affordable homeownership using the Community Land Trust practice by implementing the following scope of services.

#### Fund Development:

Access, coordinate and raise the financial resources necessary to build and sustain the capacity of the organization to accomplish the proposed housing activity.

#### Housing Production:

Search, select, acquire and rehabilitate existing properties and turn around and sell the homes to a qualified homebuyer. Meet funders requirements for acquiring, renovating and selling the home to a qualify buyer.

#### • Partnership Development:

Create and foster relationships (formal and informal) and expertise to serve the proposed housing activity.

#### Property Management:

Provide oversight for the rehabilitation required to make the property suitable for permanently affordable housing and support homeowners in transition to homeownership.

#### Outreach/Marketing:

Maintain and raise community awareness of the program; implement homebuyer search and selection processes to identify potential purchasers of homes and educate suburban communities, partners and networking resources on the proposed housing activity.

#### Closing Transaction:

Ensure purchasers are qualified for the purchase of the property and understand the Community Land Trust practice and sell the property to the qualified household according to the policies and procedures of West Hennepin Affordable Housing Land Trust and their funding requirements.

#### Compliance/Reporting:

Provide the necessary administrative, financial and risk management monitoring and reporting responsibilities.

#### Resource/Referral Agent:

Provide ongoing resources to buyers as new homeowners and work with homeowners with respect to capital improvements, resales etc.

Staff implements and monitors the Homes Within Reach program guidelines and procedures that are embedded in a variety of documents that include, but are not limited to, the Ground Lease and its addendums, procedural checklists that incorporate funding resources, real estate and organizational compliance requirements.

Staff includes the following:

#### • Executive Director

Janet A. Lindbo has held the position of Executive Director since October 2004. HWR Executive Director manages and supervises the non-profit organization, which includes, but not limited to providing fund development; housing production and project development; organizational and financial oversight; product development; marketing and community education; and board development. She offers expertise and experience in business development, housing and organizational/leadership skills due to previous work experience in operating a housing/health care organization.

#### • <u>Project Administrator</u>

Doris Gruis is HWR Project Administrator since June 2006 and provided third party accounting services to WHAHLT since January of 2005. Her responsibilities include but are not limited to, working with WHAHLT/HWR applicants in the areas of screening applicant's qualifications, homebuyer education, recruitment, and community education and providing bookkeeping and accounting services to the organization. Doris is a CPA and applies her experience and skills in working with small business owners to working with HWR applicants and vendors.

#### Administrative Coordinator

HWR Administrative Coordinator responsibilities include but are not limited to working with HWR inquiries during the initial application process and provide administrative support to the organization's operating and selling responsibilities. Currently, Pam Fryhling is holding this position.

#### **Key Vendors**

There are several key service providers critical in assisting HWR in the acquisition of property and the transactional activities of the Community Land Trust; buying, selling and transfering ownership of the home and executing the Ground Lease, which secures the property rights to the homeowner.

- Land Title Inc. provides closing services for both the purchase and sale transactions for HWR.
- House Masters provides inspection services, in addition to Hennepin County and Contractor inspection.
- Hennepin County provides PIRA and HQS Assessments
- Energy Audit is provided by GPS Inspections
- Residential Appraisal Partners Inc., provides appraisal service for acquired properties.
- Counselor Realty works with HWR in acquiring properties.
- WHAHLT's attorney, William Henney provides legal services with respect to all closing documents, reviews legal contracts and other organizational matters.
- Bearence Management Group acts as HWR insurance broker.

#### Contractor

HWR has worked with several contractors in creating affordable homeownership. They include TJU Construction, Greater Metropolitan Housing Corporation, My Home Source and PRG serving as the general contractors. These and other providers offer HWR a variety of services that include but are not limited to, inspections during the selection and acquisition phases, participation in the review process, homeowner education, contracting and determing the rehabilitative scope of services.

In an effort to stay current with building and environmental compliance requirements, contractors continue to participate in educational and certification seminars with respect to completion of courses in lead abatement, energy education and other green community requirements through organizations like mngreenstar and other

educational providers for residential building contractors and hire third party experts to implement radon, blower test/energy audits and where applicable - paint inspection risk assessment (PIRA).

#### **Lending Institutions**

Alerus Mortgage, Bremer Bank, Mid-Country Bank, US Bank and Wells Fargo are the five lending institutions that offer mortgages to HWR applicants. The mortgage bankers representing each of the five institutions are experienced with the Community Land Trust practice and HWR and can assist the prospective homebuyer/land trust applicant with home financing options offered by the bank.

#### **Attorney for Buyers**

Gregory A. Lang is available for buyers to select to review the Ground Lease and other pertinent closing documents prior to closing. Recently, the second attorney serving HWR applicants is no longer practicing law and HWR is looking for a replacement. The attorneys attend closing with the buyers to assist the applicant with questions concerning the closing process and or documents.

#### **Community Land Trust – How it Works**

West Hennepin Affordable Housing Land Trust dba as Homes Within Reach is a Community Land Trust.

A Community Land Trust organization is a -

- Nonprofit organization
- Formed to hold title to land to preserve its long-term affordability
- Receives public and private donations of land or monies, to purchase land on which housing exists or can be built
- The homes are sold to low-to-moderate income workforce families
- The CLT retains ownership of the land and provides a long-term ground lease to homebuyers to secure their rights to use the land
- The CLT retains a long-term option to re-purchase the homes at a formula-driven purchase price when homeowners later decide to sell & move,

Two key components driving the interest in Community Land Trusts are -

- A Social Component: Promoting homeownership for low to moderate income families.
- A Financial Component: Protecting the public's investment in affordable homeownership.

The Community Land Trust (CLT) is one vehicle that allows homeownership to be affordable for low-to-moderate income workforce families.

A Community Land Trust (CLT) establishes affordability by removing the value of the land from the mortgage equation to create <u>initial affordability</u> resulting in savings of principal and interest and in down payment and closing costs.

The CLT retains ownership of the land and enters into a 99-year ground lease with the leaseholder-homeowner. Therefore, each affordable home will offer affordable homeownership to 6-9 families throughout the life of the lease.

The CLT leaseholder-homeowner pays property tax on both the home and the land, and secures the rights to use the land via a Ground Lease.

Federal, State, City and private contributions fund project costs - land acquisition, buyer assistance, rehab, and holding costs.

A CLT ensures <u>permanent affordability</u> of the home through two provisions found in the Ground Lease.

- $\square$  The first is a pricing formula that provides the owner with a fair amount of equity (25%-35%), while ensuring the sale price for subsequent low-to-moderate income households is affordable.
- ☑ The second provision requires the homeowner to sell to another low-to-moderate income household. In addition, the provisions ensure the home continues to be affordable with each sale.

A CLT leaseholder-homeowner receives benefits similar to non-CLT homeowners such as the ability to build equity, the federal mortgage interest and property tax deduction and the ability to pass on the lease interest and home to their heirs.

The following Chart provides an example of how a Community Land Trust creates initial and permanent affordability (99 years plus). The example compares the difference in affordability after ten years under the CLT and conventional model.

The chart above demonstrates that after ten years, the CLT home sells for \$145,648 as opposed to \$295,662 under the conventional model, a difference of \$150,014.

There are two primary factors to account for this difference. First, the land has been permanently removed from the speculative market. Secondly, the homeowner receives only a percentage of the appreciation of the home when they decide to sell. In the above example, the owner receives 35% or \$15,648, based on a formula that is standard among CLTs (25-35%) across the United States, where the homeowner receives only a portion of the appreciation in order to make the home affordable for each subsequent sale.

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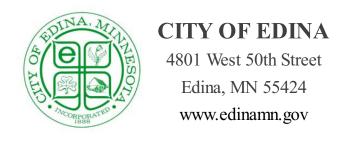

#### RESOLUTION NO. 2017-16 APPROVING A PRELIMINARY & FINAL PLAT WITH VARIANCES AT 6124 EWING AVENUE

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Edina, Minnesota, as follows:

#### Section 1. BACKGROUND.

- 1.01 Jacob Steen, on behalf of 6124 Ewing LLC is proposing to subdivide the property at 6124 Ewing Avenue into two lots.
- 1.02 The existing home and garage would be removed.
- 1.03 Within this neighborhood, the median lot area is 11,500 square feet, median lot depth is 135 feet, and the median lot width is 81.5.
- 1.04 The following described tract of land is requested to be divided:
  - Lot 3, Block 1 Engelhart Addition, Hennepin County, Minnesota.
- 1.05 The owner of the described land desires to subdivide said tract in to the following described new and separate parcels (herein called "parcels") described as follows:
  - Lots 1 and 2, Block 1, Engelhart Addition Replat.
- 1.06 To accommodate the request the following is required:
  - 1. A subdivision;
  - 2. Lot width variances from 81.5 feet to 76 feet for each lot; and
  - 3. Lot area variances from 11,500 square feet to 11,172 square feet for each lot.
- 1.07 The Subject Property is guided Single Family Residential under the City's Comprehensive Plan and is zoned R-1, Single Dwelling Unit District.
- 1.08 Previous property owners of this site have sold off small portions of land to the adjoining lots. In 1990, a (5) foot by 147 foot strip (735 square feet) was deeded to the property to the south. In 2012, an eight (8) foot by 147 foot strip (1,176 square feet) was deeded to the property to the north. If these two strips of land were not added to the adjacent lots, there would be no need for variances with this proposed subdivision. The original lot was 165 feet wide.

- 1.09 On January 25, 2017, the Planning Commission recommended approval of the preliminary plat, subdivision and variances. Vote: 8 Ayes and 0 Nays.
- 1.10 On February 22, 2016, the City Council held a public hearing on the proposed subdivision and variances.

#### Section 2. FINDINGS

#### 2.01 Approval is based on the following findings:

- 1. Except for the variances, the proposal meets the required standards and ordinance for a subdivision.
- 2. The original lot was platted to be 165 feet wide. In 1990, a five (5) foot by 147 foot strip (735 square feet) was deeded to the property to the south. In 2012, an eight (8) foot by 147 foot strip (1,176 square feet) was deeded to the property to the north. If these two strips of land were not added to the adjacent lots, there would be no need for variances with this proposed subdivision.
- 3. The proposed lots would be similar in size to all other lots on the 6100 block of Ewing Avenue.
- 4. The proposal meets the required standards for a variance, because:
  - a. There is a unique practical difficulty to the property caused by actions of a previous property owner that sold off portions of the subject property to adjacent land owners. If that property were not sold off, no variances would be required, and applicant would be entitled to the subdivision.
  - b. The requested variances are reasonable in the context of the immediate neighborhood. The existing lot is both larger and wider than most properties in the area, including the adjacent lots to the east, west and south. The proposed subdivision would result in two lots more characteristic of the neighborhood.
  - c. The variances would meet the intent of the ordinance because the proposed lots are of similar size to others in the neighborhood.

#### Section 3. APPROVAL

NOW THEREFORE, it is hereby resolved by the City Council of the City of Edina, approves the Preliminary & Final Plat and Lot Area and Width Variances for the proposed subdivision of 6124 Ewing Avenue.

Approval is subject to the following Conditions:

1. Prior to the filing of the Plat, the existing home must be removed from the site.

- 2. Prior to issuance of a building permit, the following items must be submitted:
  - a. Submit evidence of Minnehaha Creek Watershed District approval. The City may require revisions to the preliminary plat to meet the district's requirements.
  - b. A curb-cut permit must be obtained from the Edina engineering department.
  - c. A grading, drainage and erosion control plan subject to review and approval of the city engineer. The proposed plans shall meet all conditions outlined in the engineering memo dated January 18, 2017
  - d. There shall be no increase in peak rate or volume to neighboring private property.
  - e. Any disturbance to the roadway caused by the construction of the new homes must be repaired by replacing the asphalt pavement from curb-to-curb and from saw-cut to saw-cut.
  - f. A construction management plan will be required for the construction of the new homes.
  - g. Utility hook-ups are subject to review of the city engineer.

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#### **INFORMATION & BACKGROUND**

#### **Project Description**

Jacob Steen, on behalf of the property owner 6124 Ewing LLC, is proposing to subdivide the property at 6124 Ewing Avenue into two lots. (See property location on pages A1–A5.) The existing home and detached garage on the lot would be torn down, and two new homes built on the new parcels. (See applicant narrative and plans on pages A6–A18.) Both lots would gain access directly off Ewing Avenue. The existing driveway to the property would be utilized as the new driveway for the south lot. To accommodate the request the following is required:

- 1. A subdivision:
- 2. Lot width variances from 81.5 feet to 76 feet for each lot; and
- 3. Lot area variances from 11,500 square feet to 11,172 square feet for each lot.

Within this neighborhood, the median lot area is 11,500 square feet, median lot depth is 135 feet, and the median lot width is 81.5. (See attached median calculations on pages A15-A17.) The new lots would meet the median depth, but would be just short of the median area.

It is important to note that previous property owners of this site have sold off small portions of land to the adjoining lots. (See page A5 & A18.) In 1990, a (5) foot by 147 foot strip (735 square feet) was deeded to the property to the south. In 2012, an eight (8) foot by 147 strip (1,176 square feet) was deeded to the property to the north. If these two strips of land were not added to the adjacent lots, there would be no need for variances with this proposed subdivision. The original lot was 165 feet wide. (See the original plat on page A18.)

#### Surrounding Land Uses

The lots on all sides of the subject properties are zoned and guided low-density residential.

#### **Existing Site Features**

The existing site contains a single-family home and a detached garage. (See page A4.) The home and garage are to be removed. The site contains a scattering of trees throughout the lot. Along the front lot line there are Ash and Pine trees that will remain. There are a couple of large Oak trees within the proposed building pads that would be removed. The city forester visited the site to look at the Oak within the building pad on the north lot and determined that it would be very difficult to build around that tree and have it survive. The existing Oak, Maple and Pine trees along the back and side lot lines would remain. (See page A10.)

#### **Grading/Drainage and Utilities**

The city engineer has reviewed the proposed plans and found them acceptable, subject to conditions. (See memo from the city engineer on page A21-A22.) For construction of the new homes, the back yards are to drain to the west into rain gardens that will slow down and hold some of the runoff before going to adjacent property. The front of the home would drain toward the street. There shall be no increase in peak rate or volume to neighboring properties. Any disturbance to the roadway caused by the construction of the new homes must be repaired. The detailed grading plans would be reviewed by the city engineer at the time of a building permit application. A construction management plan will be required for the construction of the new home. Specific hook-up locations would be reviewed at the time of a building

permit for each lot. A Minnehaha Creek Watershed District permit would also be required.

#### History of Subdivision Requests in the Area

The City of Edina has considered several subdivision requests with variances in this general area. (See attached area map showing this locations of these requests on page A20.) The following is the history in the past ten years:

#### Requested Subdivisions in the last ten years

- In 2006, the property at 5901 France Avenue <u>received</u> variances to build four (4) 66-foot wide lots consistent with the area. (Median = 9,269 s.f. & 73 feet wide.)
- 2. In 2008, 6120 Brookview Avenue was proposed to be divided into two (2) 50-foot lots; however, the applicant <u>withdrew</u> the request before action was taken. (Median = 6,700 s.f. & 50 feet wide.)
- 3. In 2009, a 100-foot lot at 5920 Oaklawn was <u>granted</u> variances to divide into two (2) 50-foot lots. (*Median = 6,699 s.f. & 50 feet wide.*)
- 4. In 2011, the property at 5829 Brookview was **granted** variances to divide into two (2) 50-foot lots. (**Median = 6,769 s.f. & 50 feet wide.**)
- 5. In 2012, the property at 6109 Oaklawn was <u>denied</u> the request to subdivide the property into two (2) 50-foot lots. (*Median* = 6,701 s.f. & 50 feet wide.)
- 6. In 2012, 6120 Brookview was again proposed for subdivision. That request was <u>denied</u>. (Median = 6,700 s.f. & 50 feet wide.)
- 7. In 2012, 5945 Concord was <u>denied</u> the request to subdivide the property into two (2) 50-foot lots. (*Median* = 10,028 s.f. & 77 feet wide.
- 8. In 2015, a 100-foot lot at 5825 Ashcroft Avenue was **granted** variances to divide into two (2) 50-foot lots. (**Median = 6,790 s.f. & 50 feet wide.**)
- 9 In 2015, 5945 Concord was <u>approved</u> for a request to subdivide the property into two (2) 50-foot lots. (Median = 10,028 s.f. & 77 feet wide.
- 10. In 2016, 5845 Kellogg Avenue <u>denied</u> a request to subdivide the property into two (2) 50-foot lots. (Median = 6,715 s.f. & 50 feet wide.

The proposed subdivision is different from the above subdivisions, in that the subject property is not located in an area of 50-foot wide platted lots. Lots in this neighborhood are larger.

#### **Primary Issue**

#### • Are the findings for a variance met?

Yes. Staff believes that the findings for a Variance are met with this proposal.

Per state law and the Zoning Ordinance, a variance should not be granted unless it is found that the enforcement of the ordinance would cause practical difficulties in complying with the zoning ordinance and that the use is reasonable. As demonstrated below, staff believes the proposal meets the variance standards, when applying the three conditions:

a) Will the proposal relieve practical difficulties that prevent a reasonable use from complying with the ordinance requirements?

Yes. Reasonable use does not mean that the applicant must show the land cannot be put to any reasonable use without the variance. Rather, the applicant must show that there are practical difficulties in complying with the code and that the proposed use is reasonable. "Practical difficulties" may include functional and aesthetic concerns.

The practical difficulty is due to the fact that previous property owners sold off small pieces of land to the adjacent lot owners. The requested variances to split this lot are reasonable in the context of the immediate neighborhood. The existing lot is both larger and wider than other properties in the immediate area. The proposed subdivision would result in two lots more characteristic of the neighborhood. If the variances were denied, the applicant would be denied a subdivision of property which the lots would be the same or similar to existing lots in the area; specifically the adjacent lots to the east, and the lots directly across the street to the west and south. (See page A5 and A18.)

As demonstrated on pages A15-A17, the median lot size in this neighborhood is 81.5 feet wide, 135 feet deep and 11,500 square feet in size. The proposed lots would be 76 feet wide, 135 feet deep and 11,172 square feet in size, which nearly meet the medians.

As mentioned earlier in this report, this lot was originally platted at 165 feet wide. The original lot could be divided and require no variances. However, in 1990, a five (5) foot by 147 foot strip (735 square feet) of land was deeded to the property to the south. In 2012, and eight (8) foot by 147 strip (1,176 square feet) was deeded to the property to the north. (See page A5.)

b) There are circumstances that are unique to the property, not common to every similarly zoned property, and that are not self-created?

The circumstances regarding the size of the lot, and that previous property owner sold land to adjacent properties is unique to this area and within the City of Edina. If that land were not sold, no variances would be required for this subdivision. That condition

was not created by the applicant. The selling off of that property did not cause an additional lot to be created in the neighborhood. The south property was sold off due to an existing structure that was constructed on the lot line.

c) Will the variance alter the essential character of the neighborhood?

No. The proposed improvements requested by the variance would not alter the essential character of the neighborhood. Two new single family homes would be constructed on lots similar in size to all lots on this block of Ewing Avenue.

#### Staff Recommendation

Recommend that the City Council approve the proposed two lot subdivision of 6124 Ewing Avenue and the lot width variances from 81.5 feet to 76 feet for each lot, and lot area variances from 11,500 square feet to 11,172 square feet for each lot. Approval is based on the following findings:

- 1. Except for the variances, the proposal meets the required standards and ordinance for a subdivision.
- 2. The original lot was platted to be 165 feet wide. In 1990, a (5) foot by 147 foot strip (735 square feet) was deeded to the property to the south. In 2012, an eight (8) foot by 147 strip (1,176 square feet) was deeded to the property to the north. If these two strips of land were not added to the adjacent lots, there would be no need for variances with this proposed subdivision.
- 3. The proposed lots would be similar in size than all lots on the 6100 block of Ewing Avenue.
- 4. The proposal meets the required standards for a variance, because:
  - a. There is a unique practical difficulty to the property caused by actions of a previous property owner that sold off portions of the subject property to adjacent land owners. If that property were not sold off, no variances would be required, and applicant would be entitled to the subdivision.
  - b. The requested variances are reasonable in the context of the immediate neighborhood. The existing lot is both larger and wider than most properties in the area, including the adjacent lots to the east, west and south. The proposed subdivision would result in two lots more characteristic of the neighborhood.
  - c. The variances would meet the intent of the ordinance because the proposed lots are of similar size to others in the neighborhood.

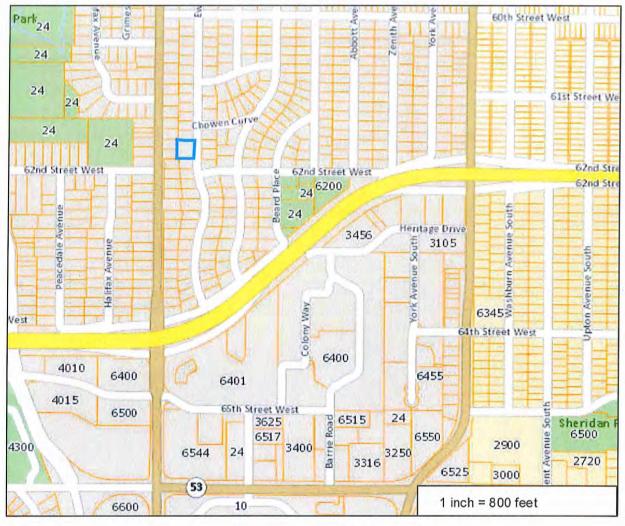
Approval is subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The City must approve the final plat within one year of preliminary approval or receive a written application for a time extension or the preliminary approval will be void.
- 2. Prior to issuance of a building permit, the following items must be submitted:
  - a. Submit evidence of Minnehaha Creek Watershed District approval. The City may require revisions to the preliminary plat to meet the district's requirements.
  - b. A curb-cut permit must be obtained from the Edina engineering department.
  - c. A grading, drainage and erosion control plan subject to review and approval of the city engineer. The proposed plans shall meet all conditions outlined in the engineering memo dated January 18, 2017
  - d. There shall be no increase in peak rate or volume to neighboring private property.

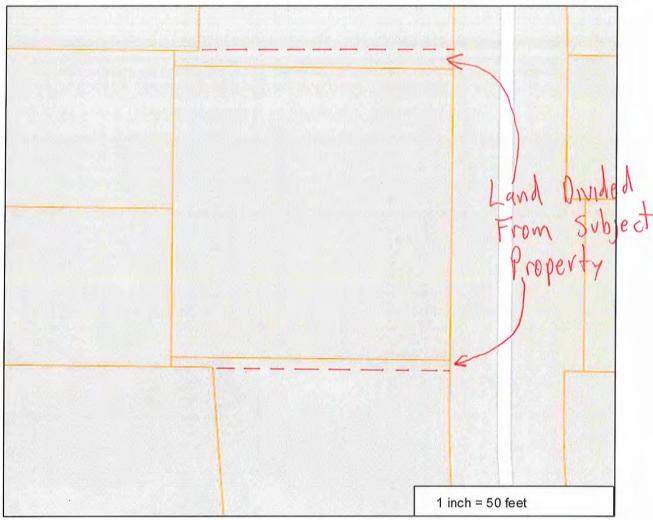

We represent 6124 Ewing LLC ("6124 Ewing"), the owner of the property located at 6124 Ewing Avenue South (the "Property") in the City of Edina (the "City"). On behalf of 6124 Ewing, please accept this letter and the enclosed materials as application for a subdivision and variances to allow a subdivision of the Property.

The existing Property is 22,238 square feet in area, 152 feet wide and 147 feet deep and contains a single family home located at the rear of the lot. The proposed lot split would create two lots, each of which would be 11,172 square feet and 76 feet wide. While the proposed lot area and width exceed the minimum requirements for the R-1 Single Dwelling Unit District, a variance is required due to the larger median lot area and width in the neighborhood as required under City Code. Accordingly, in addition to the request for a subdivision, 6124 Ewing is requesting a variance to the minimum area from 11,500 to 11,172 square feet, and a variance of the minimum lot width from 81.5 feet to 76 feet.

#### Required Variance Findings

The proposed subdivision of the Property meets the findings for the issuance of a variance to the minimum lot area and lot width as follows:

Will the proposed variances relieve practical difficulties that prevent a reasonable use 1. from complying with the ordinance requirement?

Yes. The proposed use is a reasonable use of the Property that would be consistent with the general lot widths and areas in R-1 neighborhoods. The practical difficulties that prevent compliance with the minimum single family lot size and area requirements are due to the fact that the proposed lot split would otherwise be allowed as of right if not due to previous lot line modifications to the Property and the fact that the median lot width and area in the neighborhood Stoll CITY OF EDING is higher than the standard dimensions.

The original lot was platted at 165 feet wide, which could have previously been subdivided without any variances into two (2) separate 82.5-foot wide lots each with 12,128 square feet of lot area. These dimensions would exceed the standard R-1 District minimum lot width (75 feet) and area (9,000 square feet), as well as the higher median neighborhood lot width (81.5 feet) and median lot area (11,500 square feet). However, small portions of the Property were subsequently deeded to the adjacent properties at the north and south, resulting in the need for the variances.

Prior to 1990, a five (5) foot swath of land was deeded to the property to the south, presumably to accommodate the home to the south that was built over the property line. In 2012, an eight (8) foot strip of the Property was subsequently deeded to the property to the north. The resulting lot was 152 feet wide, which, when split, results in two lots measuring 76 feet wide by 147 feet deep (11,172 square feet).

Furthermore, there are practical difficulties due to the fact that the Property is subject to larger lot dimensions based on the increased median lot width in the neighborhood as based on the properties within 500 feet of the Property. The Property was platted as a double-lot as compared to the properties on the same block. However, the increase in the median lot and area widths are skewed by wider properties located on curvilinear streets not in the immediate vicinity or on the same block as the Property. Thus, the proposed variance is necessary to resolve practical difficulties resulting both from the previous lot line modifications to the Property and the larger median lot width and areas.

2. Are there circumstances that are unique to the property, not common to every similarly zoned property, and that are not self-created?

Yes. The original dimensions of the double wide lot, in conjunction with the unusual lot line modifications to both the north and south property lines are unique to the property, not created by the applicant and not common to similarly zoned properties. The original Property was platted as a double-wide lot as compared to the vast majority of the properties in the neighborhood. The lots immediately to the west and to the east across Ewing have the same approximate lot widths as the original Property, but each accommodates two lots. The Property is also deeper than the majority of the lots in the neighborhood, including the surrounding properties.

The immediate circumstances related to the previous lot line modifications are also unique. If not for the previous unique lot line modifications, which reduced the Property by eight (8) feet on the north and five (5) feet on the south, the Property would otherwise be eligible to subdivide without the need for any variances. These conditions were created by previous owners, presumably to accommodate encroachments or otherwise substandard lots. These combined circumstances are unique to the Property, not common to similarly zoned properties, and not self-created.

3. Are the proposed variances are in harmony with the general purposes and intent of the zoning ordinance?

Yes. The general purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance is to create orderly development and to maintain and protect the character of the single-family housing neighborhoods. The proposed

variances are consistent with and in furtherance of these goals. The lot split will require the removal of the existing home, which is unusually set back to the rear of the lot, inconsistent with surrounding properties. The resulting two lots will be consistent with the typical dimensions of homes in the R-1 neighborhood and accommodate two homes of similar dimensions to those on the same block. Future development will increase the likelihood of a reinforced and consistent block face on Ewing, more uniform development scale, and modernized and efficient home construction. Subdividing the lot for construction of two new homes is consistent with and in furtherance of the spirit, intent, and purposes of the City's zoning ordinance.

4. Will the proposed variances alter the variance alter the essential character of the neighborhood?

No. The proposed variances will allow a lot split of the Property that will be consistent with the essential character of the neighborhood. The two proposed lots will measure 76-foot wide and 11,172-square feet, which is generally consistent with single family development in the R-1 District and particularly properties in the immediate vicinity.

The existing home, which is located to the rear of the double-wide Property, is an outlier in the neighborhood and inconsistent with the character of the homes in the immediate vicinity. By subdividing the lot, 6124 Ewing proposes to reinforce the essential character of the neighborhood, allowing for new homes to be built in line with the existing homes and reinforcing the block face.

Furthermore, due to the location of the trees on the Property, many of the existing older-growth trees will likely be able to be saved. This will allow new homes to be situated on a lot with existing and older trees, maintaining the established character of the neighborhood. Granting the variance will reinforce the essential character of the neighborhood, as opposed to

#### III. Approval Of Meeting Agenda

A motion was made by Commissioner Thorsen to approve the January 25, 2017, meeting agenda. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lee. All voted aye. The motion carried.

#### IV. Approval Of Meeting Minutes

A motion was made by Commissioner Thorsen to approve the January 11, 2017, meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Strauss. All voted aye. The motion carried.

#### V. Public Hearings

#### A. Subdivision with Variances. 6124 Ewing Avenue, Edina, MN

#### **Planner Presentation**

Planner Teague informed the Commission that Jacob Steen on behalf of the property owner 6124 Ewing LLC, is proposing to subdivide the property at 6124 Ewing Avenue into two lots, the existing home and detached garage on the lot would be torn down, and two a new homes built on the new parcels. Both lots would gain access directly off Ewing Avenue. The existing driveway to the property would be utilized as the new driveway for the south lot. Teague said to accommodate the request the following is required:

- 1. A subdivision:
- 2. Lot width variances from 81.5 feet to 76 feet for each lot; and
- 3. Lot area variances from 11,500 square feet to 11,172 square feet for each lot; and

within this neighborhood, the median lot area is 11,500 square feet, median lot depth is 135 feet, and the median lot width is 81.5. The new lots would meet the median depth, but would be just short of the median area.

Teague asked the Commission to note that the city engineer reviewed the proposed plans and found them acceptable, subject to conditions.

Concluding, Teague said Recommend that the City Council approve the proposed two lot subdivision of 5845 Kellogg Avenue and the lot width variances from 75 feet to 50 feet for each lot, lot area variances from 9,000 square feet to 6,709 square feet for each lot, and a side yard setback variance from 5 feet to 4.7 feet for the existing home to remain. Approval is based on the following findings:

- 1. Except for the variances, the proposal meets the required standards and ordinance for a subdivision.
- 2. The subdivision would meet the neighborhood medians for lot width and depth and nearly meet the median area.
- 3. The proposal would restore the property back to the form of the original plat, which included two lots.
- 4. The proposal meets the required standards for a variance, because:
  - a. There is a unique practical difficulty to the property caused by the existing size of the property which is two times the size of most lots on the block.
  - b. The requested variances are reasonable in the context of the immediate neighborhood. The existing lot is both larger and wider than most properties in the area, including the adjacent lots to the east, west and south. The proposed subdivision would result in two lots more characteristic of the neighborhood.
  - c. The proposed lots would be the same size as the lots were originally platted.
  - d. The variances would meet the intent of the ordinance because the proposed lots are of similar size to others in the neighborhood.
  - e. If the variances were denied, the applicant would be denied a use of his property, a 50-foot wide lot, which is common to the area. In addition, the applicant would be denied a subdivision with variances that has been previously approved with these same circumstances by the City in the last couple years.
  - f. The side setback for the existing home is reasonable. The practical difficulty is the location of the existing home in relationship to the underlying 50-foot lots in the original plat. The proposed subdivision restores the existing plat, and the structure is an existing condition. The setback is very close to the required 5-foot setback at 4.7 feet back. (See page A8.) The lot line could be shifted to meet the setback, but then lot sizes would be irregular.

Approval is also subject to the following conditions:

1. The City must approve the final plat within one year of preliminary approval or receive a written application for a time extension or the preliminary approval will be void.

- 2. Prior to issuance of a building permit, the following items must be submitted:
  - a. Submit evidence of Minnehaha Creek Watershed District approval. The City may require revisions to the preliminary plat to meet the district's requirements.
  - b. A curb-cut permit must be obtained from the Edina engineering department.
  - A grading, drainage and erosion control plan subject to review and approval of the city engineer.
     The proposed plans shall meet all conditions outlined in the engineering memo dated
     September 22, 2016
  - d. There shall be no increase in peak rate or volume to neighboring private property.
  - e. Any disturbance to the roadway caused by the construction of the new homes must be repaired by replacing the asphalt pavement from curb-to-curb and from saw-cut to saw-cut.
  - f. A construction management plan will be required for the construction of the new homes.
  - g. Utility hook-ups are subject to review of the city engineer.

#### **Appearing for the Applicant**

#### **Discussion/Comments**

Planner Teague was asked if the lot were to remain one lot how large could a new house be. Planner Teague responded based on the size of the lot the size of the building pad for this lot could be roughly 5,500 square feet. With two lots that would be cut in half.

Planner Teague was asked if the lot(s) were developed with rain gardens as depicted how would enforcement occur. Teague responded that whatever method was chosen at the time of building permit application there can be no increase in run-off. Teague reiterated the storm water management plan was submitted to the engineer and the plan was found acceptable, subject to conditions. The applicant would be required to meet those conditions.

#### **Applicant Presentation**

Mr. Steen addressed the Commission and briefly explained the history of the lot and the lot line adjustments to accommodate encroachments from adjacent properties. Continuing, Steen pointed out that the lot is large, adding that the existing structure is non-conforming with no rear yard. He said if approved the two new homes would be more in character with the neighborhood.

Continuing, Steen said with regard to runoff they are committed to ensure there would be no increase in run-off to the west. Steen added their intent was to actually reduce run-off. Steen thanked the Commission for their time and asked for their support.

#### **Public Hearing**

Vice-chair Nemerov opened the public hearing.

Richard Cook, 3705 61<sup>st</sup> Street West, addressed the Commission.

Vice-chair Nemerov asked if anyone else would like to speak; being none a motion was made by Commissioner Thorsen to close the public hearing. A second was offered by Commissioner Strauss. All voted aye. The motion carried.

#### **Discussion/Comments**

Mr. Steen was asked if it was the intent of his client to split the lot when purchased. Steen responded their first thought was to renovate; however, due to the nonconformity and condition of the home they found it was not a good candidate for remodel. Continuing, Steen added in his opinion if the subdivision was approved the proposed new homes would meet all setback and lot coverage requirements.

A discussion ensued on the subdivision process and past area subdivisions. It was noted that a number of past subdivision requests were to subdivide 100-foot lots into 50-foot lots. The lot is question is larger and the circumstances of this individual lot are unique; including that the existing house is setback deeper on the lot than other homes in the area and if new homes are constructed those homes would be more in character with homes in the neighborhood than the existing home.

Commissioners further expressed the opinion that they could support the subdivision request.

#### Motion

A motion was made by Commissioner Hobbs to recommend approval of the subdivision based on staff findings and subject to staff conditions noting the subdivision of the lot is in keeping with the neighborhood. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Strauss. All voted aye. The motion carried.

### Hello Mayor and City Council,

I live at 5717 Deville Dr, Edina, near the Nine Mile Creek Regional trail. I am eagerly awaiting the completion of the western segment of our beautiful trail!

I understand there is a request to lower the boardwalk height near Walnut Ridge park. Two thoughts.

- 1. **No impact to schedule:** I am concerned that this late request could materially impact the construction schedule. Given that there was already a lengthy public input phase of the trail, any proposed last minute change should be rejected if it materially impacts the construction schedule.
- 2. **No compromise to engineering:** I would be reluctantly OK with a lower height, for one thing it is less up and down for a bike rider. However, after considering engineering versus aesthetics I concluded that the best alternative is to keep it at the 100 year height. If it was lower, the flooded boardwalk would be covered with mud and debris and could be damaged by the floodwaters. There may not be funds allocated to clean and/or repair the boardwalk, so it could be out of service for a while.

Today I stood in the middle of the wetlands near Walnut Ridge park and counted about ten homes that would have a view of the boardwalk. To me, that is not enough to justify compromising the boardwalk engineering and potentially the construction schedule.

### Edina City Council,

As a resident of Malibu Drive and a father of 3 kids, ages 8, 11, and 12, I am concerned about my families safety each and every time we venture out of our house. Our quiet residential road has not only turned into a freeway as 169 traffic is diverted through our neighborhood, but it's traffic comprised of aggressive and angry drivers that run stops signs, speed around school buses, and otherwise show no regard for the safety and well being of anyone other than themselves.

We live on a cul de sac at the end of Malibu, and in the Winter there is a big snow pile where the kids like to play. Normally there is no traffic other than the residents of the cul de sac. We now see people that missed the Dead End/No Outlet signs drive around the cul de sac at high speed and then and burn on down Malibu. The back side of the snow pile is completely blind, so anyone driving around the cul de sac at speed cannot possibly stop in time for someone walking, or a kid playing on the snow pile. Someone is going to get killed.

If we venture out of our cul de sac and drive straight passed Telemark, we have to approach very carefully as it's regular practice for other drivers to cut right in front of us to turn (as they assume we have a stop sign).

The current traffic calming system has only created more aggressive drivers while adding considerable time to our commutes out of our neighborhood. As anyone with kids knows, it takes a village to get everyone where they need to be, and our friends are no longer able to reasonably come to our house to pickup or drop off as their commute times to our house have dramatically increased.

We shouldn't have to be afraid for our families lives simply walking, riding our bikes, or driving in our neighborhood.

We also shouldn't have to pay for the road damage due to the 2-4x volume of traffic, including heavy truck traffic.

The City Engineer, DOT, and Mayor do not appear to take this seriously. This is your job. Do something- and not half measures. Close our roads to all but residential traffic, or put pressure on the DOT to close Bren and Lincoln exits. Don't sit by and wait until someone is seriously injured or killed before taking action.

**Dear City Council Members:** 

My name is Marcia Cotter. I am the owner of Parkinson's Specialty Care located at 6802 and 6804 Dovre Drive. We provide residential living for those with Parkinson's Disease.

We are very concerned about the barricade that went up directly in front of our property on Dovre Drive. Although we understand the objective behind this, which is to slow down traffic congestion caused by the recent 169 closure, we have some serious concerns with the effects that this has created.

Namely our staff, residents and family members are having significant difficulty getting in and out of the driveways. This is more pervasive during 7am to 10am and then again 3pm to 6pm. There have been several near accidents due to people not yielding to other cars as directed by the signs. In addition, we have multiple hospital vehicles, transportation vans, delivery and maintenance service trucks that enter and exit the property throughout the day.

This increased congestion and causes significant issues when trying to park as there is no parking on the streets anywhere. We are having most of our staff park down on Lincoln to help ease the congestion but these issues persist.

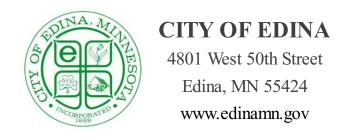
In the event that an emergency vehicle was in transport during any of the above-mentioned hours, they could have a very difficult time getting into the property.

What we feel would be a good solution to this would be to: a) remove the barricade and position somewhere else or b) remove them completely as it is a very short length of road. What we feel would be more appropriate is c) shut down the north side of Dovre Drive. This could hopefully force traffic to take the actual detour that has been set up. Even though this would cause considerable inconvenience to residents that live here, I feel this is the better and safer option at this point. There are other ways to access Dovre Drive. People in our neighborhood are aware of alternate routes and will use them is necessary.

Please consider our request as we feel this creating an unsafe situation for our neighborhood and our business.

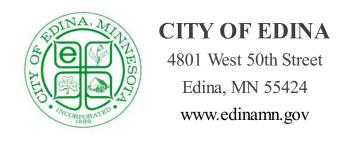

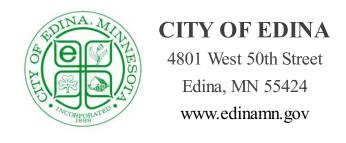
